Duncan Bole came with Wesley Horton, a liveryman (of Shedden), the night before the election, and got the box and ballots. He saw them taking it away. His father said they brought a letter, signed by Sheriff Brown and McNish, instructing him to give Bole the box. Witness saw the letter and read it and examined it at different times. The signatures were in different times. The signatures were in different to very long ago, but could not get it now. After a good deal of hesitation and equivocation he finally said it had been destroyed. Witness swore Bole did nothing wrong during the polling, but admitted he did not see or watch what was going on. He thought from 15 to 85 votes was a fair increase. He acted as poll clerk, but was not paid and did not ask for pay. a son of Richard Stafford (since deceased

did not ask for pay.

Robert Nicol, one of the Conservative scrutineers, was then called and contradicted Stafford in a number of particulars regarding the conduct of the poll, and described some of the crooked work.

In the evening James Wallis, who acted as D. R. O. at No. 5 (Five Stakes), was called. He testified that he did his duties properly. He had been approached after his appointment and urged to drop out and let a stranger act in No. 5, but refused to do so. He did not desire to tell who approached him, and when preased, said a couple of persons had talked to him. Dan McIntyre, of Yarmouth, Reform candidate in East Elgin, and nephew of McNish, was one who wanted him to let a stranger take his place. He met McIntyre afterwards in St Thomas and McIntyre took him up to Mr. Grant's law office, and Mr. Grant urged him to let a stranger act in No. 5. They did not say why they wanted a stranger. At this stage Chairman Barron asked the witness if it was not because he would be so careful outside as a worker that McIntyre and Grant wanted him to give his place to a stranger. But the witness did not assent to this suggestion.

Adjournment was made till Wednesday morning. The attendance was small, and the history was taken in the proceedings.
