THE BRANDON DUEL.

It Was Fought Last Night Be-
tween Sir Charles E. Tupper
and Mr. Sifton.

Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper and the
Hon. Clifford Sifton met last night at
Brandon, for their famous duel on the
former's Yukon charges. The follow-
ing is the result:
THE GLOBE'S REPORT.
The joint political meeting held here
last night, addressed by Hon. Clifford
Sifton, minister of the interior, and
Sir Hibbert Tupper, resulted in a com-
plete victory for the Liberals. The
audience present was the largest ever
assembled in the Wheat City, fully
3,000 listening electors and friends oc-
cupying the spacious interior.
THE MAIL'S REPORT.
"Clifford Sifton was beaten to a
standstill. It was a grand triumph
for Tupper. Sifton, who had
stayed at Cartwright. The meeting
made hundreds of votes for Hugh
John. These are the comments one
of all hands with reference to
the great platform duell between
Sir Hibbert Tupper and Hon. Clifford
Sifton, which took place in the skat-
ing rink here yesterday evening. The
duelling was one of the most dramatic
and important of the whole federal
campaign.

Tea and Coffee.
A German professor has been in-
vestigating in elaborate fashion the effect
on processes of digestion produced by
the use of tea and coffee. He pre-
pared an artificial gastric juice, and
mixed it with coagulated egg albumen,
with and without additions of tea
and coffee. While the gastric
juice by itself was able to digest 94
per cent. of the egg albumen in the
space of eight hours, when tea was
added the proportion digested was re-
duced to 66 per cent. When a decoction
of coffee was mixed with the al-
bumen the gastric fluid was only able
to digest 61 per cent., or less than two-
thirds of the albumen. The digestive
power of the gastric juice appeared to
vary with the strength of the infusion,
the disturbing effect being less when
the solutions of tea and coffee were
weakened. The professor is of opinion
that the deleterious effect produced as
due to the tannin which is extracted
during the process of making, and not
to the presence of thein and caffeine,
and he mentions that tea which has
not been allowed to stand more than
two or three minutes is less injurious
because a smaller quantity of this un-
desirable ingredient, tannin, has been
produced than when it is boiled up or
left in contact with the leaves for a
considerable length of time.
