A PRETTY PINCUSHION. This Dainty Affair Is Made of Silk.

This dainty and artistic heart shaped pincushion which properly made would ornament the finest of dressing tables is in ribbon embroidery on a delicate shade of green silk. The silk is embroidered with forgetmenots in china ribbon in pale shades of blue, with pink for the unopened buds, as is seen in the real flower. His Majesty's Efforts Have Always Been Directed to Heip Them

When General Booth's striking book, "In Darkest England," was pub in 1890, a copy was sent to the Prince of Wales, whose secretary wrote: "Pray likewise assure nim (General Booth), on the part of the Prince, that Booth), on the part o, the Prince, that his Royal Highness is confident that he cannot fail to be greatly interested by the perusal of a work that treats of a subject which for many years he has had so much at heart." The Prince was a member of the Royal Commission which considered the questions of the result tion of how far the State should com-pel the erection of suitable houses for the working classes. He took a keen personal interest in the sittings of the Commission, and was one of the most regular attendants. He visited several regular attendants. He visited several crowded parts of the East End incognito, under the guidance of Lord Carrington, and was deeply impressed by the terrible conditions under which so many of the poor lived. It was about the time when shocking revelations had stirred the heart of the nation, and the Prince determined from that moment to do all in his power to imment to do all in his power to improve the surroundings of the honest and hard-working poor. He has alluded in public again and again to this grave question affecting the social well-being of the whole community, and it worthy that his first King's and one in which generous-hearted impulse must be held in check by con-sideration of all the issues involved. But the influence of the King is great. The expression of a wish by him will sometimes go farther than an Act of parliament. His influence upon public opinion is potent, and will be exerted for the good of his poorer subjects this matter. INTERESTED IN SCIENCE. As Boy and Man the King Has Honored

It is not inapt, perhaps, to remen ber here that though the serious side of the King's life is much less understood than the popular side of it, the King had been interested from the be-ginning of his career in serious things; Inventions based on scientific research have always interested the King, who from his youth was keen on witnessing chemical and electrical experiments. He said ten years ago, in a speech at the Royal Institution: "I had the op-portunity of practising chemistry in the University of Oxford, and 1 only regret now that I have not time to pursue that interesting science." He attended the marvellously-absorbing lectures delivered by Michael Faraday, and both he and his sister—the late Empres Frederick-lost no opportunity of pay-ing honour to men of science. The developments of electricity have been followed carefully by the King, who soon recognized the value and advantages of electric lighting. When "liquid gas" was manufactured before a brilliant assemblage in London, the Prince of Wales was present as an interest of the aversiment. terested spectator of the experiment He is very fond of hearing of the lates discoveries in science, and no one who

discoveries in science, and no one who has been privileged to explain such a matter to the King has failed to gain his close attention. Appropos of the King's attendance at Faraday's lectures, an interesting autograph letter was bequeathed to the Royal Institution by the late Mr. Charles Deacon, of Newcastle. It was written by the King when he was a lad of fourteen years of age to Michael Faraday himself. In a simple, boyish style the young Prince said how much he had enjoyed the lectures, and how he counted the Professor as a friend, and would try and remember the marvellous things he had learnt from him.
