The agitator was a tall, slight man, very dark, evidently a mulatto. He appeared to Mr. Barfoot as a man with an axe to grind rather than a man urged on by a desire to free the slaves. Brown had a large cane, which he laid on the counter in the book store. Mr. Barfoot, boy-like, was looking at the cane and examing it, when he touched a secret spring and a dagger suddenly appeared. Brown was back in the store at the time and Mr. Barfoot withdrew to escape the anger that he expected his act would provoke.
