WORLD OF SPORT

CHATHAM'S CAPTURE

"What a large crowd! Why, I didn't think there were so many people in Chatham," was an exclamation overheard on Tecumseh Park yesterday afternoon while the Chatham-Wallaceburg lacrosse game was in progress, and indeed there were good grounds for the remark. The park was completely lined with interested spectators, who kept the play lively with the cheers and applause. The game was a good one, though possibly not as exciting as the recent one between Blenheim and Chatham, was an exceedingly interesting one. Both teams played well and there were just as enthusiastic for one side as the other. One commendable feature was the almost utter lack of foul playing. At times however some of the players became careless in the use of their sticks, but on the whole the playing was very clean. Sheldon, McLeod and Ross, of the local team, were all given five minute rests by Referee Appleford, during the game.

Alf Appleford, of Wallaceburg, the referee, performed his part of the game to the complete satisfaction of both sides. His decisions were always fair, and by forcing every player on the field to play the game, he made himself a favorite with the crowd. After all it is clean lacrosse which is admired from the benches and this careless slugging and slashing is not what the spectators go to see.

It was unmistakably Chatham's game yesterday. This was shown not only by the score, which was 3-1, but also by the game itself. The Chatham players have far the better of their Wallaceburg opponents, in combination work, and they gave the spectators some beautiful exhibitions of combination plays which were very noticeable in the winning of the game. This good work was particularly noticeable in the Playing of Knight, Blewett and Shillington, three of the Kents from Blenheim who were "imported" for the occasion, and who, it might almost be said, were the means of winning the game for Chatham. Richards' place in goal was ably taken by Jahnke, who played a star game and made some very clever stops. Elliott, Bennett, and Fetterly, on the defense were at their best and the ball never stayed long in their territory. Ross, a newly acquired Chatham player, and a former London man, played at centre and succeeded in covering a lot of ground. Wilson, McLeod, Blewett and Shillington on the Chatham home, all played hard and were great favorites with the crowd, who were not slow in recognizing and applauding swift and difficult playing.

On the Wallaceburg side, the honors were equally divided among, Mooney, Rose, Tierney and Dawse, four ex-London players. All of these men played hard, but well, it was no avail, they were outplayed.

The rest of the Wallaceburg players did well and succeeded in holding down the Chatham men to a certain extent.

MAPLE CITY SCHOOLS IN FULL SWING AGAIN

Teachers and Pupils in Harness for Another Year's Work—
Attendance at the Opening Very Encouraging
Many Improvements.

Principal Plevess was on hand bright and early at the Central school, to receive both his teachers and pupils. The big, bright school with its roomy and airy corridors, appeared very attractive and the floors freshly oiled gave the interior an odor of newness. The attendance for the opening day was large, about 650 being present. In the kindergarten alone, there were 60 pupils. There were three new teachers, Miss Irwin, the Model School assistant, Miss Florence Mitchell, who is substituting for Miss Jessie Snell, who is attending Normal. William Robertson was the only trustee who called. He came and spoke cheerfully to the pupils, and then went away. The Model School opens this afternoon. Twenty-two pupils enrolled, and several more will be present, when school opens to-morrow. This is expected to be one of the most prosperous years in the history of the Model School. Principal Plevess says that he has a very likely looking lot of pupils.

McKEOUGH.

With happy faces and prospects of much school fun and enjoyment, did 400 odd pupils flock to McKeeough school this morning, the opening day. The attendance was above the usual

for the first day. All the teachers, having returned from their vacation, were present, and the staff for this term is the same as it was. The school building has, during the holidays been thoroughly renovated. The halls have been kalsomined, metal ceilings have been put in the halls and the hall on the second floor presents an exceedingly pretty appearance. It will be made a regular picture gallery.

The new sanitary arrangements being made at the school will be finished by October. All the rooms, with the exception of Mr. Brackin's had school all day.

COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE.

The attendance at the opening of the high school, was about 250, between 90 and 100 of whom were entrance pupils. The commercial class (Mr. Collins) opened with about 45, and prospects of a second room. The typewriting room in this department has been enlarged and new ventilation made. Among those at the school from outside points are 14 from Dresden and seven from Jeannette's Creek. Mr. Sisson, the new master, will divide the English with Mr. Patterson, and the drill with Mr. Collins. Mr. Sisson is a likely looking young man, fond of athletics and will no doubt be a great favorite on the field with the boys.

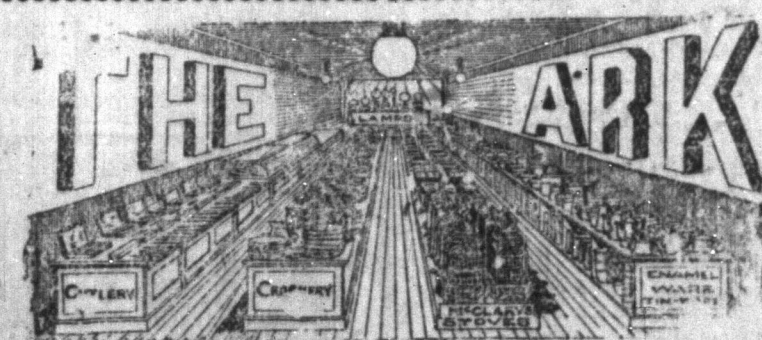
