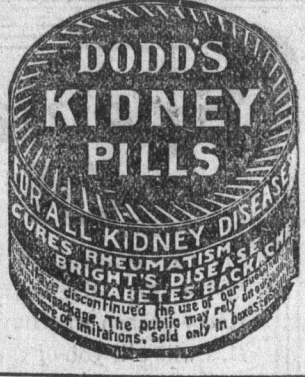

TOULON FIRE LOSS \$900,000.

ROBBERS RAID A BANK

CASHIER REFUSES TO BE HELD UP IN DAYLIGHT.

Draws Revolver and Fires at Thieves—Fierce Fight Follows—One Man Captured by the Crowd—Other Taken to Hospital Dying—Demanded All Cash Available—Met With Warm Reception.

A daring attempt was made recently by two desperadoes to rob the National Bank in Johannesburg, and in the pitched battle with the bank officials which followed one of the men was fatally shot.

Banks and business houses generally have armed their employees in consequence of frequent burglaries in Johannesburg during the last few months. Pedestrians have been held up and robbed in lonely streets, residences have been ransacked and shops looted in the most audacious manner.

This bank raid, however, was the boldest attempt yet made.

Two men entered the Harrison street branch of the National Bank when some of the officials were at lunch, and practically no business was being transacted.

Walking boldly up to the cashier's window, one man thrust a revolver into the hand of the cashier and demanded all the cash available. Meanwhile the second man kept guard at the street door.

Instead of complying with the demand, the cashier drew a revolver from a half-open drawer, and fired point-blank at the robber. The bullet hit him on the jaw, and he dropped to the floor.

The second robber immediately returned the fire; and half a dozen shots were exchanged with the employees behind the counter. One bullet struck a clerk in the shoulder, but the other shots went wide, and were imbedded in the walls and ceiling.

The noise of the fusillade attracted men from the street, and they captured the second robber as he tried to bolt through the door, carrying his revolver. He was overpowered after a severe struggle. The other man was removed to the hospital dying.

Expenses of Government.

Some very interesting items appear in the Imperial Government appropriation accounts for the year ended March 31, 1906, which were issued recently. The accounts include Parliamentary grants for Civil Service classes and revenue departments, including postoffice, packet and telegraph services. The gross total grants amounted to £50,267,562, but the expenditure was kept well within bounds, so that there is left the handsome surplus of £798,308.

Amongst the more curious details are £1,804 for the construction of a motor-car garage at the Royal Mews, Piccadilly; £608 for the construction of a lift at St. James's Palace; and a marriage grant of £77 to a female warder at Holloway. Getting rid of the old laundry and bakehouse at 10 Downing street and making a new scullery cost £471, and new washhouses at Windsor Castle £157. Another notable item is the fact that, owing to absence of fog, South Kensington Museum saved £13 on its lighting bill. Coming to bigger affairs of state, we learn that the Dogger Bank outrage inquiry cost £1,866; the Algeiras Conference, £648; Prince Arthur's mission to Tokio, £2,174; and Lord Selborne's traveling expenses in South Africa, £1,200. The smallest item in the list is the New Hebrides Commission, which stands at the figure of £15. The biggest is for the maintenance of the ex-chief of Mosquito in Jamaica, namely, £13,231.

Two Hen Stories.

One of the inmates of the Animals' hospital, Hugh street, Westminster, London, is a two-year-old hen, one of a family of nine, who is suffering from a peculiar disease in its crop. The other eight have all died, one after the other, with the same disease, and special efforts are being made to save the life of the last. "Every day," says the doctor, "an India rubber tube is inserted in the bird's mouth, and its crop is filled with warm water. Then the hen is turned upside down, and the water allowed to trickle out. At first the bird was naturally indignant, but now she seems to even like it."

At Moulton Seas End, near Spalding, Mr. Dilworth lost a fine fat hen five or six weeks ago, and it has just been found in a hovel a mere bag of bones. It could not get out, and had gone all that time without food.

Hidden In Gully.

A strange discovery of sovereigns, for which, up to the present, no owner can be found, was reported to the Wandsworth Borough Council recently.

The surveyor, Mr. Marten, stated that a total of \$105 in gold was found by employees of the council in a gully in Clapham Park road the other day. Twelve pounds were found in three separate amounts, the other nine pounds being discovered after a special search.

The men who made the strange discovery refused to surrender the money at first, but were at length prevailed on to do so. The matter was reported to the police, but despite this fact, nobody has yet claimed the money.

Ald. Lorden suggested that "the least said is soonest mended," and the subject was dropped.

Historic Relic Doomed.

The house in which Daniel Defoe wrote "Robinson Crusoe" is doomed to demolition. This is the old manor house standing back from the road opposite Footing Junction, and surrounded by an old-world garden. The house is seldom visited by English people, but many Americans alight to inspect it on their way to visit Merion and what is left there relating to Nelson.

SALOON-KEEPER KILLED.

The End of An All-Night Carousal In New York.

New York, April 27.—An all-night drinking bout in a West Side saloon ended in a general fight early yesterday, in which one man was shot to death, another was arrested on a charge of murder, and eight others were held as witnesses. The dead man, Patrick J. McCarthy, a saloon-keeper, and the alleged slayer is Frank Cassidy. When the police searched McCarthy's pockets they found a loaded revolver and a blackjack.

Miller and Smith went in one direction and Kelly and White in another. The first named pair reached the residence of Conway Dobbs, at Parkmore, next morning. They were in the last stages of exhaustion, and as they entered the house they sank helplessly on a couch.

Restoratives were applied, and when they had regained sufficient strength they related their terrible experience.

A search party was at once organized, and with Miller and Smith acting as guides they all tramped to the spot where Connolly had been left. He was sitting there still wrapped in his companions' coats, but dead. He had been frozen to death.

Later in the afternoon the dead bodies of Kelly and White were found in the middle of a frozen mountain stream. The men had evidently stumbled there, and had been too weak to rise.

FORGOTTEN ROYAL STATUE.
Has Stood In Famous London Square For Over Century.

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HE WARMED THE DYNAMITE.
Samuel Johnson Blown to Pieces Near Rochester.

Rochester, N. Y., April 27.—Samuel Johnson, aged 55 years, of Millville, was killed by an explosion of dynamite yesterday, his body being blown to pieces. Yesterday morning he was in a barn warming dynamite for the day's work, when a terrific explosion, which was plainly heard in Medina, occurred, striking the barn and setting it on fire. A horse and a cow were blown through the side of the barn and killed. Johnson's body was badly burned in the fire, which destroyed the barn. He leaves a wife and daughter in Lockport.

A MOUNTAIN TRAGEDY.

THREE MEN FREEZE TO DEATH WHILE ON EXPEDITION.

Go Astray In Fog and Have Terrible All-Night Experience—Were Paralyzed With Cold—Slept the Endless Sleep—Two of Party Reach Safety—Rescuers Came to Late to Save the Others.

A mountain tragedy, involving the death of three men, was reported from County Antrim recently.

Five men, named Connolly, Keilty, White, Millar and Smith, started on a shooting expedition on the mountain range which overlooks the beautiful Vale of Glenariff.

Two or three hours later they lost themselves in a dense fog. They wandered aimlessly about and endeavored to find one of the beaten tracks, but without success.

At length hunger brought on extreme fatigue. The men, alone and lost in the mountains, had scarcely the strength to walk, and the bitterly cold wind partially paralyzed their limbs. Darkness came on, and the men were still ignorant of their whereabouts.

After a while Connolly said he would go no further, and he fell to the ground exhausted. His four companions, although almost as weak as he, picked him up and, by an effort which taxed their remaining strength to the utmost, carried him over boulders and through gullies until they themselves were on the point of collapsing.

Then they put him down, placed him under shelter in a sitting position, wrapped him in their greatcoats and, having thus done all they could for his comfort, left him and went away to look for assistance.

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
