RELIGIONS OF INDIA

The eldest religion in India, it is stated in the general report on the last Indian Census, is the medley of uncomfortable superstitions known as uncomfortable superstitions known as Animism, which conceives of man as beset by shapeless phantasms, mostly impersonal, requiring diligent propitiation by rites and magical ceremonies. Those returned as Animists number 8,580,000, mostly found in Bengal. In the higher forms of Hinduism pantheism is found closely associated with a deeply ingrained belief in transmigration, and a still more universal belief in "karma." Between the extremes of practical magic and pantheistic metaphysics Hinduism includes a bewildering variety of pessimistic creeds. The number of Bramanic Hindus is 207,050,557, or seven in ten of the popula-557, or seven in ten of the popula

Mahomedans number 62,458,077.
The actual beliefs and practices of the Mussulmans differs considerably, and the uneducated are deeply infected with Hinduism. Buddhism is professed by 9,476,759 persons. The Burmans, although nominally Buddhists, adhere at least to the ancient Nat, or demon worship, Buddhism being only the superficial polish. The Sikhs, who nearly all live in the Punjab, and the Jains, who live mainly in the Bombay Presidency, both tend to describe themselves as Mindus, so that their respective aumbers, 2,195,339 and 1,334,138, are probably understated. The London Chronicle says: "Vice-Admiral Sir Archibald Lucius Douglas, who has been appointed to succeed Sir John Fisher as Commander-in-Chief at Portsmouth, has had a in-Chief at Portsmouth, has had a distinguished naval career. He was Commander-in-Chief in the East Indies from 1898 to 1899, and in the latter year was appointed a Lord of the Admiralty, in which capacity he remained at White Hall for three years, when he was appointed to the command of the North America and West Indies station. In this position, which he holds at present, Admiral Douglas will be succeeded by Vice-Admiral Bosanquet, who also followed him as Commander-in-Chief of the East Indies station. It is mearly thirty years since Admiral Douglas was selected by the Admiralty to proceed to Japan as commander of the Naval Mission, whose duty it was to instruct the Japanese navy. For two years he acted as director of the Imperial Japanese Naval College in Yedo, and, on relinquishing the appointment, received the special thanks of the Mikado. The brilliant success attained by the Japanese navy in the present war must bring special gratification to a man like Admiral Douglas, who was so honorably associated with its first beginnings." JSE OF PERSONAL PRONOUN

Why the Uncultivated Appear Always to Be Talking of Self.

All the uncultivated appear almost al-ways to be talking about themselves, but it is easy for a superficial observer to exaggerate the extent to which this is the case. For instance, if you discuss with a cultivated man a question of morals or the wisdom or rectitude of any particular line of conduct, he will tell you what he thinks right or what he thinks wrong or what strikes him as wise or foolish, with very little use of the personal pronoun. He can see the situation from the outside. But if you discuss it with an uneducated man he is incapable of this detached attitude of mind. The uneducated man can only picture the circumstances to himself by picturing himself in the midst of them. What he thinks right and wise is, no doubt, often a great deal better and wiser than what he would actually have done. "Such and such a thing was wrong; I should not have done it," he says, or: "Such and such was foolish. Now, had it been me, I should have done so and so." To the sophisticated listener he gives an impression of appalling self righteous-ness and even perhaps of hyprocrisy, but the impression is a mistaken one. He argues in the vocative case, because it is the one in which he can most easily express himself. Some people, it must be admitted, at-

tract confidences from those who have no weakness for making them. We are not alluding to those persons who by a method of deft cross questioning manage to abstract information with which they have no business. Such information is not confided by its original owner, but stolen from him, or at least wormed out of him. The people we mean have that in their face and bearing which makes all the world at home with them. Whoever meets them may know that they are incapa-ble of giving a snub or a rebuff to ans one who claims their sympathy, be he never so silly. They go about the world unarmed and unafraid and, to give human nature its due, unhurt. Unconsciously, it is they who make the first confidence, telling those who see them, even for the first time, that they are sympathetic and detached, and as shrewd as they are harmless.-London Spectator.
