REACH MODUS VIVENDI.

Britain and the United States Fix Up the Newfoundland Fisheries Trouble For Season.

Washington, Oct. 6.—It was anacunced at the State Department yesserday that a modus vivendi had been
reached with the British Government
relative to the Newfoundland fisheries,
that will, it is believed, be satisfactory
to the Gloucester fishermen.

The modus vivendi was concluded
by Ambassador Reid with the British
Foreign Office. Under it the British
Government agrees for Newfoundland
not to interfere with the use of purse
seines by American fishermen. Newfoundland passed a law prohibiting
such seines, which the United States
fishermen claim are necessary.

Another law passed by Newfoundland, which, it is agreed, will not be
enforced, is that forbidding the shipping of Newfoundland sailors and fishermen by American fishing schooners.

The United States agrees not to fish
on Sunday, to pay light dues, and
when practicable to report to the custom houses when they go on the fishing grounds. The American fishermen

when practicable to report to the custom houses when they go on the fishing grounds. The American fishermen claim that often ice prevents them from reporting to the custom houses, and this, according to the modus, is regarded as a valid exouse.

The American Government recognizes the right of Newfoundland to require that the fishermen shall report to the custom houses so that the Newfoundland authorities may know what fishing vessels are on the grounds.
