## ISOLATION HOSPITAL BILL LAID OVER BY HEALTH BOARD

Contractor Carswell Will Have To Wait For Money Due Him For Plans For Proposed Addition

### —Other Matters

The Board of Health were presented with an account from Contractor Carswell yesterday afternoon for the sum of \$15, which Mr. Carswell claims is due him for plans drawn up for the proposed new isolation hospital, the building of which was abandoned by the Board on account of the present state of the city finances.

At the time when the building was first contemplated, Mr. Carswell was asked to draw up plans for the work, the cost of which plans was not to exceed \$15, and it was stipulated that in case the work was proceeded with, he was not to be paid for the plans. If the Board decided not to go on with the work, he was to be paid.

The Board took no action with regard to the bill at yesterday's meeting. Dr. Charteris said that it was likely that the building would be proceeded with next year. The matter was left over to be dealt with at a later meeting.

A petition was received from residents on Elizabeth street, asking that a sewer be constructed on that street, from the northerly end of S. C. Walker's property to the north end of Elizabeth street.

Dr. Hall said that he was not ready to report on this sewer yet, and the Board took no action with regard to the petition.

A bill from the Bell Telephone Company showed that an extra

charge of \$5 had been made for a long distance instrument which had been installed at the isolation hospital.

Mr. Richards inquired why it was necessary that a long distance phone should be installed at the hospital. He was told that the other phone did not work very well, and conversation could not be heard over it at times.

"Then why didn't they get the telephone people to fix it?" inquired Mr. Baxter. "It was probably only the batteries which were out of order."

It was decided that an ordinary wall phone should be installed instead of the long-distance instrument at present in use.

London, Nov. 6.—A despatch to Reuters' Telegram Co. from St. Petersburg last night says: "A report has reached here that 17 officers were shot yesterday by revolutionists in the streets of Kutno, Poland. The town is in a state of panic owing to fear of military reprisals."

Tolmie Wins by 471.

Warton, Nov. 6.—The official returns in North Bruce Dominion by-election, according to the declaration of Mr. James Walmsey, returning officer, made yesterday, show Mr. Tolmie's majority to be 471. McLelland polled 2,135 votes.

Millions of Stamps Useless.

Ottawa, Nov. 6.—Millions of postage stamps belonging to the Government have been rendered useless. They were part of the reserve stock, placed in a new strong room in the postoffice. They became damp and stuck together.

whether the meeting should be called before these figures arrive, or after.

Ald. Scullard—Mr. Beck might have them when he arrives in Chatham.

Ald. Austin—When the engineer was here last year, he discouraged the idea of Chatham securing electric power, but I understand that since that time they have done more figuring, and the outlook for Chatham is better.

Ald. Potter favored taking the matter up at once. In doing so he referred to the recent deal in the natural gas business, and wanted to know where the city stood on the question now.

It was the general opinion that there was nothing to do and that the city had nothing to say. The most of the aldermen thought, from the press report last night, that the city would be at least in a better position as regards gas, and the arrangement might be the best one for the city.

Ald. Austin—The rate as given is lower than it is in any city in the province now.

Ald. Edmondson thought there was no kick coming from the gas situation, but he strongly favored the proposition to get after Niagara power.

It is quite likely that a meeting of the power users of the city will be held at the latter end of this week to meet Mr. Beck.

The meeting was called for the purpose of passing two local improvement by-laws for sidewalks on both sides of Adelaide St., from King St. to McGeorge Creek. These were put through their various readings.
