Dining Room Garden.

If there is a bay window in the dining room by all means convert it into a
tiny plant room. This will be productive of far more pleasure then a window seat, no matter how comfortable
the latter may be. The same plan will
answer for either purpose, however, if
the space inclosed is left hollow, as it
usually is. For plants the top of the usually is. For plants the top of the window seat must be removed and state pan about fourteen inches deep must be made to order and securely fitted in the hollow space, says Table Talk. This must be firmly fastened in position, but yet left so that it may be easily removed if it seems desirable convert it into a window seat again.
