LAST NIGHT'S MEETING.

Last night's meeting of citizens to discuss the proposal to join with the Electric Railway Company in the cost of building a new bridge will be productive of good, as it is only by the interchange of opinions that we can get a better understanding of the relative positions of the questions involved from both sides.

The meeting was largely attended and was a thoroughly representative one, which indicated a desire on the part of the ratepayers to make themselves familiar with the arguments advanced by those who favored an equal division of the cost of construction, and those who were in favor of a smaller appropriation. It was clearly indicated that the general consensus of opinion was that the ratepayers, in the course of a few years, would be called upon to expend a considerable sum of money upon Third street bridge, and that this was an opportune time to join with the Electric Road in a proposal to share the expense of a new structure that will meet the necessities of a rapidly growing and progressive corporation.

Ex-Mayor Campbell and others thought that 20,000 was not an excessive amount to contribute to an undertaking that would cost at least \$40,000, while others thought that one-half this amount was ample for the city's share. In considering this question sentiment should not be allowed a place, it being a purely business proposal, and it is for the ratepayers to consider what is best for the municipality as a whole. We all concede that a bridge having a width of twenty-eight feet is not too great, and that by the construction of a bridge having a carrying capacity of at least one hundred tons, with an electrical swinging attachment and concrete roadbed, and ample room to serve all the requirements of the public, is what we want; and if we can determine what is an equitable amount we should pay, the matter can be easily settled.

It is unfortunate that no definite understanding was arrived at, as his worship the Mayor clearly indicated it was the desire of the Council to submit a by-law that would not suffer defeat, but that whatever amount was embodied in the by-law should carry by a sufficiently large majority to clearly indicate that the appropriation was generally approved of.

During the discussion many points that were not clearly understood were made plain, and as the Council does not meet until Monday evening next, The Planet would suggest that another meeting should be called before the end of the week to pass a resolution that would fairly represent the popular opinion of the ratepayers as to what extent they were prepared to go in the submission of a by-law to the people.

The question is one of very great importance to the city as a whole, and we should not delay in reaching a decision in the matter. If a by-law is to be submitted to the ratepayers it should be done at once, as there is nothing to be gained by delay.

Nothing definite has been settled yet, but in about three weeks a meeting of the heads will be held to discuss the matter.

The First Fiction.

The "Tale of Two Brothers," written 3,200 years ago by the Theban scribe, Ennann, librarian of the palace to King Merenptah, the supposed Pharaoh of the Exodus, is the oldest work of fiction extant. The tale was written apparently for the entertainment of the crown prince, who subsequently reigned as Seti II. His name appears in two places on the manuscript—probably the only surviving autograph signatures of an Egyptian king. This piece of antique fiction, written on nineteen sheets of papyrus in a bold hieratic hand, was purchased in Italy by Mme. d'Orbigny, who sold it in 1857 to the authorities of the British Museum, where it is now known as the D'Orbigny papyrus. Other specimens of ancient Egyptian fiction have since come to light which appear to prove that the Nile valley was not only the birthplace of the arts and sciences, but was also the cradle of romance.
