The Kings County Temperance Alliance

PRONOUNCEMENT OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL AND APPEAL TO THE CONSTITUENCY.

In consideration of the existing facts and conditions connected with our Municipal Council and the record of its work during the closing term, the Kings County Temperance Alliance finds it imperative to refer to the late administration concerning questions which are of the most vital concern to the conscientious voter and to the constituency in general.

MOST IMPORTANT GOVERNING BODY.

To the ratifiers of the County Municipal Council is the most important branch of our Government System, because it is the only legislative body that imposes direct taxation on the people. The cost of schools, administration of justice, insane and poor asylums, as well as enforcement of temperance legislation, is assessed directly on the property of the district.

INCREASED VARIATION.

It must have been noticed by all ratifiers who have taken sufficient interest in the proceedings of the Council to study carefully the records of its doings, that there has been a large increase in taxation within the past few years. In 1907 the total amount assessed on the County was \$19,611.89. In 1908 this was increased to \$21,524.71, while for 1910 the ratifiers are called on for \$26,019.23, showing an increase of 30 per cent. Some of this additional taxation may be justified, but a few instances will show how readily the expenditure may be increased without corresponding benefit to the people at large.

SCOTT ACT MATTERS.

In regulating Scott Act matters the Council is culpable of serious disapproval. As the type of Scott Act Inspector materially affects the primary object for which the Alliance exists, it was the custom of years to wait upon the Council and to ask for the appointment of the man who was considered to be the best qualified for this most important position. In 1907 the Alliance delegation waited upon the Council and urged for the re-appointment of Mr. Ira L. Cox as Scott Act Inspector for the County, but the appeal of the committee was not favored, and a man chosen by the Council was not the man chosen by the Alliance. NOTE THE RESULT.—In 1907 with Mr. Cox for Inspector the total cost to the County was only \$77.54, while in 1909 under the new Inspector, it rose to \$1004.56 with no apparent improvement in the work performed. By conditions existing throughout the County there is much that would lead us to believe that the same energy and efficiency have failed to characterize the prosecution of this department of work. The Council is responsible for this failure because it attempted the work without the recommendation of the staunch temperance people of the County. It has thus disregarded the experience of these men, as well as the services they have rendered the cause of temperance and the personal sacrifices they have made in the better interests of the County. It has also ignored the co-operation which was always vouchsafed through the Alliance.

While the primary object of the Alliance is now, as in the past, the total suppression of the liquor traffic by all lawful and legitimate means, it also takes the broader ground that there are allied and kindred evils to be dealt with, and it seeks along moral and economic lines to lift our citizenship to a higher plane, to encourage the independent voter to take a firm stand for right and justice, and to unite all moral forces of the community without respect of party or creed in the carrying out of these higher ideals of public life which means so much for the general welfare of the County. The religious, moral, social and commercial intercourse are all strands which we are weaving in the fabric of citizenship.


The Problems of Road Building.

THE IMPORTANCE OF DRAINAGE.—HOW TO KEEP WATER, THE GREAT ENEMY OF ROADS, OFF AND AWAY FROM THEM.

Important road construction problems were discussed as follows by Dr. Joseph Hyde Pratt, state geologist of North Carolina and president of the Appalachian Good Roads association, in an address delivered by him before the Appalachian Engineering association at Winston-Salem, N. C., on May 6 last.

The location of a road is really the only permanent part of a road, and therefore in determining the location it must be very carefully worked out, so that when once the road is constructed there will never be any question regarding any change in its location. In constructing a road, between two points the shortest distance is, of course, desirable, but it will often be found that "the longest way around is the shortest way home" and that the shortest distance between two places is not the practical route for a road on account of the excessive cost of constructing the same. We have often seen roads that were located apparently so as to make the shortest distances, and the result has been that the road followed up one hill and down another regardless of how steep the rise and how sharp the descent. Roads located as this one are passable, but a team can haul only from one-third to one-tenth of what it could on a well graded road. We have often seen roads that were muddy a good part of the year, and we have passed over them at different times of the day without ever having seen the rays of the sun strike the surface of the road. It has been thought to the reason we would probably have found that the road was located on the north side of a hill or in rather heavy woods. This is a mistake that has often been made and is still being made, but every road engineer should as far as possible avoid locating a dirt road on the north slope of a hill or mountain unless it is absolutely necessary, and in that case the woods should be trimmed up so that the sun's rays will be given every possible facility to reach the road's surface and keep it dry. This does not apply as much to roads that are to be surfaced with stone.

While looking over this equipment last Wednesday we were much impressed with the layout made, more particularly in the large tanks erected for a tank business of this sort. There are six tanks all told, some of them holding seven thousand gallons each. A large steam boiler carrying one hundred and twenty-five pounds pressure, with engine, and Otis Benson elevator of Toronto to carry the crude Sulphur and Lime to the third story, preparatory to mixing. Steam pipes, pulleys and shafting all through the building with a Dynamo from the General Electric Co., of Toronto, to supply their own electricity. A railway siding to the works will take six cars at a time for either unloading the crude material or sending out the manufactured Lime Sulphur solution. We were informed by Mr. Frazier that Mr. J. J. Gates of this town has contracted to make two thousand 40 gallon barrels to ship the out-put over the valley.

Our only wish to the Niagara Spray Co. is that they may sell all they are preparing to make, and that the Nova Scotia apple crop next year will make up for this season's deficit, and that the fruit may be free from that so dreaded fungus which has meant so many thousands of dollars loss to the fruit growers in the past.—Acadian Orchardist.

In making a survey for a road between two points there may be two or more routes that will seem available, and one or more of these will have certain features that are more favorable than the others. Each route should be carefully considered as to what grading should be necessary to bring it to the grade required, what will be the expense of the culverts and ditches necessary to take care of the water and what will be the cost of maintenance. Another question in regard to the location which should be given a certain amount of consideration is the number of people that will be benefited by the road. All these questions must be carefully considered before anything definite is decided regarding the location, and whatever location is decided upon it ought to be a permanent one.

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
