

Immigration to Canada for Ten Months Totals 141,609; Cana-dians Return from United States

OTTAWA, March 2.—Inmigration to Canada, including Canadians returning from the United States, has averaged little over fourteen thousand a month for the ten months of the fiscal year up to and including January, according to a statement just issued by the Depart-ment of Inmigration and Colonization. The total is 141,609. Regular immigration, not including re-turning Canadians amounted to 102.577, of which 49,363 were British, 13,721 from United States and 39,493 from other countries. Canada, who in January returned

Canadians who in January returned to Canada after residence of six months or longer in the United States and de-clared their intention to remain per-manently in the Dominion, totalled 1.716. The number of such returning Canadians since the beginning of the fiscal year is 29,032.
