BUYING CANADIAN GOODS

The appeal is being made to Can-Canadian-made goods and thus to keep Canada's factories running during the present crisis. The logic of the appeal is that every dollar spent on the output of Canadian factories is the dollar that remains in Canada, giving employment to Canadian workmen, enabling the manufacturers to purchase more raw material and serving to help Canada generally to maintain its commercial and fin-

ancial equilibrium. There is special reason why the farmer should consider this appeal at this time, without prejudice.
