Local and Provincial

Newcastle's Patriotic Auction Day Wednesday, October 20th—don't forget it.

Evan Price, the well known divisional superintendent of the L. R. C. at Campbellton, died last week.

Eighty-eight recruits enlisted with the 64th Battalion at Fredericton last month.

Rev. W. B. Rosborough, a Lorgeville pastor, has resigned to become a chaplain in the Canadian Overseas force.

The Moncton Cornet Band scored quite a hit at the Chatham fair on Wednesday last.

Peter K. Stewart, of Newcastle, won a \$25.00 prize for horses at the Fredericton show.

Weldon Clark, formerly 46th Batt., Holdersville, N. B., has been reported killed in action.

Dorchester, N. B., is having an epidemic of whooping cough. Several deaths have resulted.

William Perrin, aged fifty years, a laborer of Truro, N. S., was killed last Wednesday afternoon by being run down by an L. C. R. engine.

Patrick McDermott, an aged man who lived near the railway track, at St. Stephen, was struck and killed by the incoming train on Wednesday morning.

Mrs. H. F. McLeod and children will leave in a few weeks for England, where she will join her husband, Lieut. C. G. McLeod, officer commanding the 12th Reserve Battalion at Shorncliffe.

St. Bert B. Bogan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bogan, of St. Mary's, is now in charge of an entire section of the Army Medical Corps of the First Canadian Division in the West.

Bathurst is soon to have a brass and iron foundry established there. Messrs. Frank and Percy McCallum, formerly of Chatham, are at the head of it.

The Moncton Transcript says that Jewel McLeod, who had enlisted with the 64th Battalion, was unable to pass owing to slightly defective eyesight.

Albert Maillet, who was locked up in the Moncton police station on a charge of having robbed a mail bag, made his escape on Wednesday morning. It is thought he had outside assistance.

Ross Brown, aged 19 years, a sailor on board the pocket ship, Walter C. was drowned at Dipper Harbor, Wednesday, while attempting to board a small dory. The body was recovered by fishermen. He was unmarried.

The St. Alexander, which ran on the upriver route during exhibition week at Chatham, had a large passenger list on her 1.15 trip on Thursday. The Newcastle stores closed for the half day and many took advantage of the holiday to see fair and races.

Mr. J. F. Masterson of Paterson, N. J., arrived in Fredericton on Thursday and registered at the Queen. He was returning from a hunting trip in the Miramichi woods. He was successful in killing two bears but bagged no moose. One which he fired got away.

The Tribune letters that a company is being organized to establish a weekly publication, and that several Reg. Grange and Bonaventure County men have returned from a stock as well as a number of others throughout New Brunswick. The publication will not be a general newspaper but will handle provincial news. The place of publication it is said has not yet been definitely settled. St. John, Moncton and Campbellton being at present the places spoken of—Campbellton Tribune.

Mr. and Mrs. David Savoy, of Tabernash, received a telegram from Saskatoon on Monday, the 20th inst., conveying the sad news that their son George had been killed there by falling a distance of fifty feet from a bridge, on which he was at work, and had fractured his skull causing instant death. No further particulars have since been ascertained. The remains arrived at his home here on Saturday, the 25th, and were interred in the Catholic cemetery at Neguac on Sunday afternoon. The deceased who was about thirty-five years of age, was unmarried, and had resided in the west for some years.

Alonso Johnson, Richibucto, was tendered a presentation reception and dance in the Globe Theatre hall on Wednesday evening, Sept. 22nd, given by his friends in honor of his enlistment with the 64th Battalion. The hall was beautifully decorated with bunting, maple leaves and cut flowers. Music by the town orchestra, B. E. Johnson, leader, and Miss Mame Murray, pianist. The party was chaperoned by Mrs. W. R. Robertson, of Boston. Friends being present from Moncton, St. John, Chatham and Boston.

H. Price Webber, the well known actor, who has been ill of late, has taken a turn for the worse, and is now in a precarious condition at Portland, Me.

Hon. J. K. Flemming has been compelled by the seriousness of his illness to return to his home in Woodstock, and his friends are much alarmed regarding his illness.—Gleaner.

The trotting stallion "Game of Chance" owned by B. Lint, made a new record of 2:13 for the Maritime Provinces for stallions at Thursday's races at Chatham.

Miss Ethel M. Bennett of Cross Creek, who married W. F. Fawcett, united in marriage on Wednesday in Fredericton. The ceremony was performed by Bishop Richardson.

Miss Mary F. Ceholan, one of St. John's best noted singers, died at her home there Thursday morning, after a lengthy illness. She was well and all having attained ripe old age. He was a brother of the late John, Scott and James Fairley, all of whom were identified with the lumber business and known to all of the older citizens of New Brunswick, as they were noted for their prominence in this branch of industry.

The late Mr. Fairley was a man of remarkable physique and possessed considerable literary ability along poetic lines, and was of a very generous nature. His only sister, Mrs. Kenneth Cameron, predeceased him some seven years. Mr. Fairley's home was noted for its hospitality to all, irrespective of the worldly status of the guest, and the many friends who have been entertained there will sincerely lament his death.
