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
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# West Land Regulations.

family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section available Dominion land in Manltoba Saskatchewan or Alberta. The appli cant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending

Duties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sis-

In certain districts a bomesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Prica \$3.00 per acre

Duties-Must reside upon the home. stead or pre-empfion six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has oxhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain pre-emption may enter for a purchas. ed homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties .- Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
