C.E. Cathedral.



Benefit Concert.





New Things in Hazing

German Soldiers Made to Clean Rooms With Toothbrushes.

Berlin, Dec. 15.—Through the publication in the Manchester Volksstimme of the letter of a soldier in Grenadier Regiment 119, an unusual instance of hazing of recruits by officers has just come to light.

According to the writer, one officer, in case any recruits during instruction were unable to give the names of their superior officers, made them turn a chair upside down and sit on one leg for a quarter of an hour. In the same regiment the soldiers were once compelled to clean the entire

non-commissioned officers' quarters with toothbrushes and fill their wash basins with teaspoons.

An inquiry has proved the charges to be perfectly true, and the colonel has announced that he is going to have the officers severely punished.

Oil Fields in Turkey

Great Britain Has Taken Them—Supplies Used for Navy.

London, Dec. 15.—Although English interests failed to obtain oil fields in Colombia, Great Britain will get important concessions under a new treaty with Turkey shortly to be signed.

According to the correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, at Constantinople, the clauses include a grant to Great Britain of all oil wells in Arabia, Mesopotamia and perhaps Syria.

The supplies will be used for the British navy, which in future will be largely propelled by oil. The concession is a sequel to First Lord of the Admiralty Winston Churchill's recent utterances regarding the importance of the navy's possessions of a good supply of oil.
