In the other the young lady, who had a radiant smile on her face, asked me to have a seat in the gentleman's office, said she thought perhaps he would be in shortly, and asked me if I had seen the morning's paper. While I waited, telegraph boys, colored porters and everyone that walked into the office got the same sweet smile that I did. Anyone who went into that office in the morning would feel good all day long."

A Strong Protest.
(New York 'Evening Post.')
One of the most forcible British protests against the action of the Economic Conference of the Allies at Paris, signed by Lord Bryce, Lord Loreburn, Lord Courtney, F. W. Hirst, John Burns, Sir John Simon, Lord Ashton, and others, takes the direction of a thorough defence of free trade. Their letters to the press reject the plea that trade after the war will be something quite different from before. It will be the same; and the war has proved free trade to be as strong as protection is weak. It was free trade that supported the enormous mercantile, manufacturing, and shipping industries of Britain, and that has made Britain's industrial munitions-makers of her Allies, her ships their transports, her money their support. In France, especially, the protectionist policy had been shown to have prevented the development of ports or shipping, and has increased the burden of the war. The splendid British organization is a direct result of the open-door policy. But it is especially pleasing to find that signatories lay stress on the value of free trade in promoting good will. If protectionism is adopted against Germany, they believe that she will be less able to make material restitution after the war, and thrown into a more militarist policy as the sole escape from an intolerable position. Upon the basis that the war has vindicated free trade, and in large part shown the folly of an opposite policy, volumes might be written.

The Bishop of Newfoundland at Robinson's and Crabbes.
Special to Evening Telegram. ROBINSON'S, Aug. 30th.
A glorious Sunday was followed by a beautiful day. The Bishop had to wait for a long delayed express train, so there was no necessity of rushing matters, so saying good bye to the people of Sandy Point, the Bishop, Chaplain and Rector went to St. George's in the evening and remained on that side until the arrival of the train at six o'clock. A run of two hours brought us to the railway station at Crabbes, where Messrs. Jeremiah Chaffey and Jas. Gosse were waiting with their carriages and took us to the settlement of Crabbes. Hospitality was extended to the Bishop by Mr. J. Chaffey and to the Chaplain by Mr. Gosse. Confirmation was held at eleven o'clock in the new church at Crabbes. His Lordship dined at Mr. Chaffey's, while the Chaplain sampled the home-grown mutton of Mr. Isaac Chaffey. Almost immediately after dinner, in two motor boats lent for the occasion and well loaded with the good people of Crabbes, start was made for Robinson's. A beautiful day, a calm sea and a soft wind made the shore run by water most enjoyable.

The Bishop received a most enthusiastic welcome from the people of Crabbes and Robinson's. Landing from the motor boats he was drawn in a carriage by willing hands to the house of Mr. Geo. Sharns. Bunting was very much in evidence. The roar of many guns gave expression to the feelings of the people in extending to the Bishop their glad welcome.

Confirmation service was held in the old church at Robinson's in the evening. A crowded congregation witnessed the laying on of hands. The Bishop in his address congratulated Robinson's on the goodly showing of young men who were either at or preparing for the front, thanked the people for their hearty reception and wished them every success in their contemplated efforts to erect a new church. Many of the houses were illuminated and the effect in the darkness of the night was very beautiful. Robinson's is one of the most beautiful settlements in the whole island and here during summer months many tourists revel in the delightful sport of salmon fishing or having a complete rest far from the maddening crowds.
