## Great Panic in Bucharest

Population Fought to get on Trains as Russian Army Approached.  
London, Jan. 6.—The Daily Chronicle publishes the following, sent by its correspondent at Jassy, the new Roumanian capital, under date of Dec. 15:

"Persons who left Bucharest just before the entry of the German and Hungarian forces, give terrible descriptions of the state of panic which seized the inhabitants. It may be said to have commenced from the day after it became known that the Government had decided to move to this city, and that the allied Ministers, with their staffs, had already left."

"At the station there was a scene of indescribable muddle and disorder. People in hundreds, civil and military, with mountains of baggage, in one hopeless mass, were fighting and struggling. Train after train was sent off as it could be made up, either northward toward Jassy or to the west with Galatz as its final destination. The writer left in one consisting of no fewer than sixty carriages of all kinds. This train, drawn and pushed by three engines, presented an extraordinary spectacle, as every corner of carriages and corridors, the steps, and even the buffers were packed with people of every class, and the roofs were green with soldiers. It crawled slowly along."

"This, however, was nothing to what occurred a few days later when it became known that the town was not to be defended. Although cordons of military barred the way a regular siege of the station took place. Revolvers were used freely. Many deaths occurred from people being knocked down and trampled under foot. More than one soldier is also stated to have paid with his life for his devotion to duty. An Englishman who left on the day before the occupation of the town states that he saw the most savage of fights for places on the train by which he traveled and that persons fought on the roofs for a few feet of space, more than one being hurled to death on the stone pavement below."

"Those of the better classes who had motor cars at their disposal, left town by road on the first alarm and it must be said with regret that many of those whose duty it was to remain were the first to sneak off in the night."

## How to Pick a Lobster

When you go to pick out a lobster for cooking, select one that kicks, such is the advice Mrs. Mary C. Pickett gives in the National Food Magazine, the editor of which calls her the "lobster queen" and says she is the best known lobster broker in the United States.

Mrs. Pickett quotes the ancient Hebrew law against eating anything that has died of itself, and says that the moment a lobster is taken out of salt water it begins to die and its flesh deteriorates. So the excellence of a lobster depends in large measure on the length of time that lapses between his being taken from the water and his being served at table. When a lobster moves his claws feebly he is nearly dead, and, though not unfit to eat, his flesh will not be firm and tasty.

Keepers of first class restaurants have experts to select their lobsters. These pick them over as soon as received, sending some to be boiled at once and reserving others for broiling.

The finest lobsters come from the coldest water, and Mrs. Pickett says those caught south of Cape Cod do not amount to much, their flesh being not nearly so firm as those from Maine waters.

The only way to tell if a lobster is in really good condition is by its liveliness. If it struggles vigorously, flops its tail and "makes wide open mit its claws," it is all right; if it is lethargic, opens its claws wearily and shows no sign of fight, it is dying and should be let alone, for it is not cheap at any price.

"The lobster," writes Mrs. Pickett, "should be boiled in the morning for use at dinner and kept in a very cold place, but not in direct contact with the ice, and it is better not to remove the meat from the shell until just before preparing it in any desired way."
