LONDON, To-day. David Lloyd George, British Premier, returned to-day from the continent, where he has been in attendance upon the Inter-Allied Conference. The Premier was accompanied by Eltherton Venizelos, the Greek Premier. They were met at the station by A. J. Balfour, British Secretary for foreign affairs.

**GERMAN ARTILLERY ACTIVE.**

LONDON, To-day. An announcement by the War Office to-night on the campaign says: During the day enemy artillery has shown increased activity at a number of points on the Ypres battle front. Heavily shelling has been particularly heavy throughout the day against our positions in the neighbourhood of Passchendaele.

**BERLIN REPORT.**

BERLIN, To-day. A supplementary report this evening reads: In the west, the east and Macedonia nothing special has occurred. South of Sugana Valley on the Italian front further high positions have been captured.

**WAR SUMMARY.**

The Italians apparently are holding the Teutonic Allies fast along the greater part of the curving battle front extending from Lake Garda, south of the Trentino region, to the Adriatic Sea. Small gains have been reported for the Teutons on the northern front, and at one point along the southern reaches of the Piave River

on the Asiago Plateau, where it was feared he might break through the Italian line and force a retirement of the armies guarding the west bank of the Piave River, the enemy has again met several reverses, the Italians meeting his vigorous attacks with their customary stamina and repelling them with serious losses. Indeed near Canevato, west of Asiago, so strong and brilliantly executed was the Italian counter thrust that the forces of General Diaz even were able to liberate Italians who had been captured in an attempted flanking operation before the Italian line was stiffened last week. To the northeast of the town of Asiago the Germans report the capture of the town of Fonzaso and northwest of Asiago on the Setti Communi the fortified position of Mont Longara. On the southern Piave between Monte San Dona and Zanzon, some 33 miles northeast of Venice, enemy forces crossed the stream and established a bridgehead on the west side of the Piave. The Italians, however, immediately turned upon the invaders and forced them back towards the bank of the river. In realization of the close proximity of the enemy to Venice, preparations are being made to protect the ancient city and its historic buildings from the shells of the guns of the invaders. Sand bags have been piled high around the Palace of the Doges and Campanile. Doubtless most of the numerous works of art for which the city is famous already have been removed. Out of a maze of contradictory statements regarding the situation in Russia, the salient fact seems to stand forth that the Bolshevik forces still are in control in Petrograd. A wireless despatch received in London announces the complete defeat of the followers of Kerensky and Korniloff on Monday in the fighting at Tsarskoe-Sioe, while in Petrograd the recalcitrants are declared to be maintaining the upper hand against the Military Cadets and other adherents of the

Kerensky Regime. Despatches from Denmark assert that advices received there are to the effect that the Bolshevik soldiers and sailors in Petrograd are committing all kinds of excesses and that the populace generally is terror stricken. Except on the Austro-Italian front there have been no military operations of great importance.

**NAVAL AERIAL REPORT.**

LONDON, To-day. An Admiralty statement dealing with aerial activity of the British naval forces on Monday says: On the afternoon of November 12th naval aircraft carried out a bombing raid on Vlissinghem (Belgium) airdromes; several bombs were dropped on the objectives. Visibility was only fair owing to a haze. During patrols which have been carried out several engagements with enemy aircraft have taken place, in one of which a hostile scout was shot down in flames. All of our machines returned safely.

**RELATED NEWS.**

HOUSTON, Texas, To-day. Advances of the destruction by a submarine of the Danish barque Fido in the North Sea were received here to-day by the company which loaded the vessel just before she sailed last April. According to the communication the barque was sunk almost in sight of its port, Redkeetling, Denmark. The captain and crew were saved.

**BRITISH CASUALTIES FOR WEEK.**

LONDON, To-day. British casualties reported for week ending to-day were: Officers killed or died of wounds 297, men 4,376; officers wounded or missing 789, men 19,594. This gives a total of 25,956 casualties, as compared with 21,891 casualties for the previous week.

**CANADIAN CASUALTIES.**

OTTAWA, To-night. To-night's casualty list of 641 names reports 26 Canadian soldiers killed in action, 31 died of wounds, one died whilst a prisoner, one reported dead through German sources, 3 wounded and missing and 4 missing. The balance are wounded, gassed or ill.

**BRITISH PARLIAMENT AGAIN PROLONGED.**

LONDON, To-day. The Commons to-day adopted a bill extending the life of parliament for another eight months, carrying it to July 30th. This is the fourth time the life of Parliament has been prolonged.

**A WEIGHTY MATTER.**

NEW YORK, To-day. Billy Mike, St. Paul, outfought Jack Dillon, Indianapolis, in a ten round bout in Brooklyn to-day. In the latter round Dillon was content to assume the defensive. Mike weighed 176 lbs. and Dillon 167.

**WE LEAVE THIS TO OUR READERS.**

PARIS, To-day. The resignation of the ministry followed its defeat in the Chamber of Deputies by a vote of 277 to 186. Professor Paul Painleve organized the Cabinet on September 14th and succeeded Alexandre Ribot as Premier, whose ministry resigned on September 7th. The new Cabinet, which consisted of fifteen ministers, four ministers of state and eleven under secretaries, came immediately under fire of the Socialists, who were opposed to Ribot as Foreign Minister. The Cabinet resigned on Oct. 22nd, but President Poincaré refused to accept the resignation on the ground that the Chamber had voted confidence in the Ministry. Ribot was then eliminated from the Cabinet, being succeeded by J. Louis Barthou as head of the foreign office. The re-constituted Government received a vote of confidence of 228 to 137; the opposition votes were partly from the Socialists, partly from the Radical Socialists. The vote seemed to indicate hesitation on the part of the Chamber to defeat the Ministry by a direct vote during the war. After reading his declaration, Premier Painleve said he accepted discussion of the Government's diplomatic and military, but not interior policy. The question of current scandals being thus barred, Abel Ferry condemned the new war council as merely an Inter-Allied Secretariat Bureau. Deputy Millerand advocated the appointment of a Generalissimo for the Allies. The Premier replied: that even if we could have such a Generalissimo disposing of all the Allied troops to his fancy he would need a permanent Inter-Allied general staff. Why demand the impossible and not accept the possible? M. Renaudel said the Socialists refused to vote confidence in the Government; this accounts virtually for all the abstentions.

**CADORNA REFUSES TO ACT ON COMMITTEE.**

PARIS, To-day. The Temps correspondent on the Italian frontier says that General Cadorna, former Commander-in-Chief, has declined the offer to represent Italy on the Inter-Allied Military Committee.

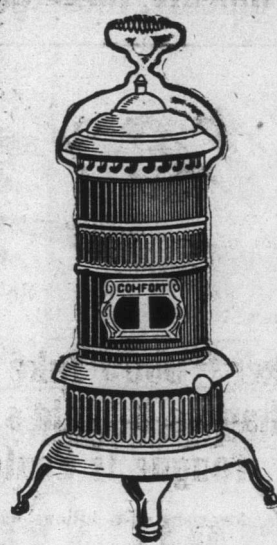
