TRY IT ON YOUR GUEST ROOM. Have a guest room grown less common because people do not make such long or such frequent visits because guest rooms have become scarce? If You Have One I took my typewriter in hand to write something about guest rooms, and then the question as to whether there were enough of them extant to make it worth while assailed me and following that came the above question.

Personally, I am inclined to think that neither the hen nor the egg came first, but that they were contemporaries.

To return to the guest room (we used to call it a "spare room" by the way). I am going to make my remarks anyhow, because even if you haven't room for one now, I know you mean to have one some day when you move out of the apartment into a house, or when you buy a larger house, or when you build that wing.

Just as if You Were a Guest.

And when that day comes, let me suggest an experiment. You have furnished your room and consider it ready for guests. Try living in it for a day or two yourself--not just sleeping in it with your own bedroom as an annex, but really living in it. I have a feeling that you may make some changes in it at the end of that time.

Maybe you will find some way to

have the bureau placed in a more convenient light.

Maybe you will realize that a feminine guest has need of a hair receiver. Perhaps you will miss a waste basket. How seldom one finds a waste basket in a guest room, and yet one could be bought for ten cents, if necessary.

Some Respectful Suggestions.

You will doubtless perceive the need of some sort of towel rack if you have not already provided one. The passing of the old commode and towel rack was an aesthetic good fortune (I wonder if they will ever come back as antiques?) but rather an inconvenience where nothing takes their place. One does not like to hang a damp towel over a chair back, but neither does one like to stand and hold it all day. The inside of the closet door is respectfully suggested for a towel bar, again available for ten cents if one does not care to pay more.

To supply a place to write a letter is another courtesy that a guest will appreciate. Even if you have only an old kitchen table painted over, and covered with a blotter, a guest would enjoy the opportunity to attend to her correspondence in the privacy of her room.

Of course your guest room may be already supplied with all these conveniences and comforts, also with sufficient closet space, a good readable book to pick up (not a "right book") with bulbs in the electric lights (sometimes one suspects that whenever a bulb gives out the lack is supplied from the guest room and the matter forgotten) and all the other delicate little attentions guests appreciate. If so, I have done you an injustice. I humbly crave your pardon.

## Warehouse Damaged by Fire.

Yesterday at 4:05 p.m. an alarm of fire brought the West End Fire Company to George Street, where a fire was discovered in the Warehouse of Messrs. P. H. Cowan & Co.
