Cashin, Leader of the Opposition asked the indulgence of the House to refer to a serious matter, viz the article which appeared in the Daily Star of Saturday last entitled "Gambling for a Graveyard." Sir Michael then read the following resolution.

"RESOLVED: That this House before proceeding with the consideration of the Address in Reply. feels called upon to place on record its indignant and forceful protest and emphatic condemnation of the article in the Daily Star newspaper, the organ of the Prime Minister, of Saturday last, entitled 'Gambling for a Graveyard.' This article constitutes a brutal and uncalled for attack upon His Excellency the Governor in regard to a purely personal matter and one which in the opinion of the House in no way war rants the criticism directed at it."




