#### Awful Ants.

##### GREATEST INSECT ENEMY.

The Argentine ant appeared in England, during the war, but it was not until 1918 that it became a danger. It has been reported by for- ants before. Hundreds of houses in the Durham colliery village of Ry- were once infested by herds of insects which were of a sort unknown in this country. They ate everything eatable, and would a basin of sugar in a single night. They were particularly partial to the plague became so serious that the bodies of the dead had to be carefully watched. Eventually

the colliery owners were obliged to engage experts to deal with the plague, and the nests were dug out and destroyed. These ants came from Egypt whence they had been imported in bales of hay.

They Eat Houses—But Not Whole. On another occasion white ants appeared at Leadgate, Durham, and in the following year at Grindon Hall, Sunderland. Commencing operations in the fernery they descended upon the house, making it nearly uninhabitable. An Indian engineer who was called in, found a colony of over half a million ants in the fernery, and succeeded in destroying them by the use of a chemical solution.

The white ant or termite is one of man's greatest enemies in the insect world, and is particularly plentiful in South Africa and Australia. The insect lives upon wood, and from the earliest period of the white man's settlement on the shores of Botany Bay, the tiny creature has waged never-ending war against him by devouring his furniture, books, clothes and house.

A building in the country known to be affected by white ants become un-

saleable at any price. The white ant is an unseen worker. Generations may have lived and worked and died without their presence being suspected. It is only when joists and timbers are reduced to a shell, and suddenly collapse, that the cause of the disaster is revealed.

White ants will flourish as far north as France. A huge colony of them obtained lodgment in the French Navy yard at Rochefort, and the damage done before they and their successors were exterminated amounted to more than a million francs.

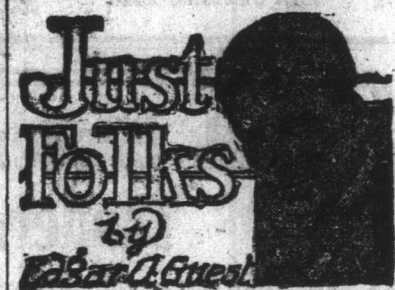

#### German Losses in Great War.

England won the toss and made excellent use of the batting opportunity. At the close of play the score was 362 for four wickets. 25,000 spectators witnessed the match.

BERLIN, July 25.—Germany lost 1,792,368 men killed and 4,246,874 wounded from 1914 to 1918, according to a revised compilation of the German casualties during the war. In addition 200 men are still reported as missing. The losses in the navy, which are included in the casualties given above, were 34,256 men killed and 31,085 wounded.
