## Reparation Conditions Granted Germany.

Græco-Turkish Armistice Advised --- Imperial Troops May Intervene --- Numerous Bergs South of Cape Race.

### INTERNATIONAL MORATORIUM GRANTED GERMANY.

PARIS, March 22. A partial moratorium was granted Germany for her reparation payments for 100 days. The plan carried with it specifications that Germany raise 500 million marks (paper) in her budget, stop exportations of capital and make the Reichsbank independent, radically reduce expense and submit to a system of supervision. If these conditions are not fulfilled by April 21 the moratorium may be revoked.

### URGE ARMISTICE.

PARIS, March 22. The Allied Foreign Ministers convened here have sent telegrams to Greece and Constantinople urging an armistice between the Greek and Turkish forces facing each other in the Minor.

### LET SEPARATE THEM WITH INTERESTS.

LONDON, March 22. The British Government have to consider whether it will be possible to give a cordon of imperial troops between the warring elements along the Iberian frontier. Winston Churchill stated in the House of Commons to-day.

### DEFINITE SPLIT.

DUBLIN, March 22. It was officially announced by the Republican organ here to-day that the Irish Republican Army Convention, the holding of which was recently forbidden by Arthur Griffith, President of the Dail Eireann, will be held in Dublin on Sunday as arranged. The announcement was taken here to mean a definite split in the Republican ranks has come. According to Constance Roderick O'Connor, Director of Engineering at Headquarters Staff of the Irish Republican Army, eighty per cent of the Army's members believe that the Army has been "let down" and Dail Eireann has been "let down" to the Republic oath by agreeing to include Ireland in the British Empire.

### Valuable Coal Deposit.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,—Having heard much talk of a coal mine, that some company in St. John's was working at Marley's Cove, T.B., and being in that vicinity a few days ago, I made a visit to the scene of operations, and was agreeably surprised to find that the reports I had heard were not exaggerated in the least. Mr. James Rendell, who is Vice-President of the Company in charge of operations there, and with a crew of eight men, has since November driven a slope 100 feet long into the side of the hill, about 20 feet from where the seam crops through the surface. After looking around the place a little while, and having a cup of tea in the comfortable mess-house, which the Company have built for their men, I asked for and obtained permission to go down into the slope. One of the men was sent with me to carry a light to guide us on our way down. I had gone but a few feet when I was compelled to stop and gaze with wonder at the sight which met my view. On either hand, above, below, and in front of me seemed to my eyes to be nothing but coal. I was told by my guide, however, that where I was standing, the seam did not carry sufficient pressure, but that as they went further down, the quality improved. I was also informed that the slope which I visited was driven mainly for the purpose of determining the general direction and depth of the seam, and that the results were quite up to expectations. I had the pleasure of seeing some of the coal burning in a stove at the camp, and to my mind it had the appearance of anthracite. One thing puzzles me about this business, and that is the secrecy that has been maintained. True the Company has issued a Prospectus offering shares for sale, but they seem to have been quietly passed around to friends, and no advertising has been done. Is it the purpose of the promoters to let a few of their personal friends in on a good thing, and then sell out to some foreign concern who may find it to their interest to keep it locked up? What is our Government doing in the matter? At least the Minister of Agriculture and Mines should investigate and see what is being done, so that the country may reap some benefit from it. So far as I can learn, the Company is composed of men of limited means, but who have faith enough in the proposition to risk their money in it, and if so, they deserve to get encouragement for their efforts. However, after seeing the place, Mr. Editor, I feel sure that those people are on the right track, and I am backing that opinion with my money. Here's success to you gentlemen of the Trinity Bay Mining and Development Company, and let us hope that in taking care of our own interests, you will not forget that you also owe something to our dear old Terra Nova, and that you will make her interests identical with your own. Brandy had long before shattered the reputation, the genius, and the health of the older actor, who had been very ill throughout the winter, and was utterly unfit to sustain the great fatigue and excitement of such a night; but he went to the farewell, in which in the old days he used to stir the very souls of the spectators. He broke down at the words—"Othello's occupation's gone!" Then, gasping for breath, he began: "Be sure, thou—unable to proceed, he fell upon his son's shoulder, moaning—"I am dying—speak to them for me." And so the curtain descended upon him for the last time.

### Schooner J. W. Miller at Halifax.

CAPTAIN REPORTS SEAMAN KILLED—BODY BURIED AT SEA. Yesterday Messrs. Crosbie and Co. received a message from Capt. Stan Duder, of the schooner J. W. Miller, reporting the accidental death of a seaman named William Rice, a native of Cape Broyle. The schooner is now at Halifax on the way to this port from Bahia, which port was left on January 18th. The message states that Rice was struck by a falling block, on February 18th, and died as a result of his injuries. His body was buried at sea. The deceased is learnedly unmarried. On receipt of the message, Mr. J. Peters wired Rev. Father Maher of Ferryland, particulars of the happening. The J. W. Miller is making a long passage to this port having met very bad weather. When the coast was reached the vessel became jammed in the ice, but managed to make Cape Pine. Captain Duder found it impossible to get down the shore and was obliged to run for Halifax, where he is awaiting a favorable opportunity to reach his destination.
