> Sweden's Naval Programme.

STOCKHOLM. - A parliamentary commission supported by navy experts has proposed for the Swedish Navy a building programme for the next ten years of four fast armored cruisers, 12 destroyers, six big torpedo boats, three mine layers, 22 submarine chasers and a number of smaller craft. The armored cruisers are to be 6,500 tons each with a speed of 30 knots, with eight 21 centimeter and six 12 centimeter guns. As the proposal is based on parliamentary consideration there is a probability of it being passed during the coming sesons of Parliament.
