

The North Riding Election Protest Case.

The protest against the election of Col. Higinbotham for North Wellington makes but slow progress before the Speaker. The redoubtable Jacobs went to Ottawa last week to give evidence with respect to validity of his security. We are informed that he had no real estate registered anywhere in the Dominion, but that he owned a farm in Arthur Township, near-Kenilworth; that this farm was worth \$3,500, having been offered \$3,000 for it a day or two previous; that he bought this farm from Geo. A. Drew, and got a deed for it about a year and a half ago, but did not recollect who witnessed said document or when it took effect. He also gave the same evidence in reference to a piece of property in Mount Forest, known as the Allan and Fiddes Survey, claiming to hold that property jointly with Drew, and to have a joint deed from him, but not registered. An application was made by the sitting member's counsel to the Speaker for an order to produce these deeds, but he refused to grant it.

Col. Higinbotham had to pay Jacobs \$70 travelling expenses, before he would give a word of evidence, the Speaker allowing him 10 cents a mile each way, but all the leading lawyers, in the House, Opposition and Ministerial, say that he has no authority for allowing him more than his actual expenses. Jacobs will therefore most likely have to disgorge part of the sum paid. We understand that Jacobs' evidence is the subject of much comment among the members in Ottawa, and all are of opinion that it will be a difficult matter for him to convince the people that the property transactions referred to are bona fide. We have little doubt, from all we can learn, that the Speaker is determined to overrule all objections made against the petition, and send it to a Committee. In doing so he is, no doubt, faithfully following out the promptings from a higher source. With regard to the Centre Riding petition, we believe Mr. Ross is giving the securities quite a scare. Mr. Powney, the principal security, is very much wanted at present to give evidence, with respect to his standing. It is somewhat singular that the gentleman cannot be found just now, but we can assure him, if he only turns up, and goes to Ottawa he will get a thorough overhauling. We hope he will come to the front and tell all he knows about his property.

A BURNED CHILD'S FEARS.—The N. Y. Daily Bulletin, speaking of our railway and canal policy, makes the following timely note of warning:—The programme of Pacific railroad and construction, announced in the speech of the Governor-General of Canada, presents topics of fierce controversy and excitement. The control of a total of not less than \$200,000,000 is involved in these measures. This is a prodigious sum to be expended among a sparse population, not so numerous as that of New York State, and spread over an area larger than the whole United States, territories and all. It is sufficient to convert the entire adult male population of the New Dominion into a race of office-holders and contractors. The effects of this system of Government works on the politics of the New Dominion may be inferred from our own Credit Mobilier revelations, and from the corrupting influences of the Erie Canal on New York politics and legislation for more than a score of years past. The Canadians are undoubtedly destined to pay a heavy price for any stimulus imparted to their material development by the corruption of their political system and the social extravagance involved in the handling of money which they never earned. They are mortgaging the future at a rate not warranted by their material growth, and the result must be to increase the taxation and the cost of living, and thus neutralize the advantages which the New Dominion is now offering to emigrants. Of course these considerations are the very last that will engage attention on the other side of the frontier. A vast amount of money has to be spent, and there will be a fierce struggle for the spoils. Notes of the coming conflict are already heard.

Mr. E. B. Wood and the Mail.—On Saturday Mr. Wood exposed a despicable trick of the Mail, in asserting that he had changed his views on the Pacific Railway, and had voted contrary to what he had done on a previous occasion. Sir John Macdonald, in making the charge, pretended to read from the Journals, but when Mr. Wood demanded the Journals and sent a page for them, he showed that John A. had no authority for the statement he had made, and that it was one of the Premier's tricks which reflected no credit on him in his barefaced attempt to deceive the House. Mr. Wood lies in this matter clearly convicted John A. and the Mail of misrepresentation, if not of deliberate falsehood.

THE INCREASE OF SALARIES.—It is pretty generally believed in Ottawa, that in connection with the vote of \$75,000 to be placed at the disposal of the Government to adjust official salaries; it is the intention of Ministers to make a liberal addition to their own stipends.

THE PROPOSED PROROGATION.—The rumors with respect to the prorogation that obtain most credence are, that if possible the Government will bring the business to a close on the 6th of May. Some even affect to believe that the event will occur a day or two earlier than that date. The eagerness of the Ministry to be rid of inconvenient questions may be readily imagined, but certainly no Government could have a more meagre record than they have up to the present moment.

SOMETHING is supposed to be brewing amongst the French members of Quebec. They are constantly holding caucuses, irrespective of party. The fact is believed to have reference to a combination, to support Mr. Dorion, as leader of the interests of that Province in the Commons. Should such turn out to be true extraordinary developments may be expected before the close of the session. MINISTERS are hurrying through with the supplies, in order to close the session at as early a day as possible, so as to choke off discussion.






