That when sewers are constructed along any street the property fronting on said street shall pay such proportion of the cost as may be determined by the several bylaws on the basis of a ten inch sewer, and that the city shall pay the proportion determined by the bylaw and also any extra cost above that of a ten-inch sewer.

2. Every corner lot which faces on two streets shall be entitled to an exmption of one-half the frontage on each street, the amount of exemption to be paid by the city at large.
