Washington, June 2.—Viscount Canada, the ambassador from Japan, yesterday called upon Secretary Bryan with formal notification that Japan had accepted the proposed plan advanced by the United States for universal peace. No Bearing on California. The Japanese foreign office has not yet called the ambassador definite instructions regarding the submission of a resolution to the last American note, and it is known that it is considering the matter.

## WHERE DO ALL THE PINS GO?

Fifty-Four Millions Are Made In England Every Day

Has the housewife ever asked herself the question, "How much do pins cost a year, and how many pins have I wasted during that time?" In England every day, says Tit Bits, there is an output of over 54,000,000 pins. Birmingham, the greatest center of the industry in this country, alone produces 37,000,000 pins per day. The output of other pin manufacturers in this country is only about half that of Birmingham. In France the daily production is 20,000,000 pins. Germany and Holland produce 10,000,000 pins per day. The total output for Europe each day is therefore 84,000,000 pins.

It is seldom that a pin gets broken or worn, and the question is, therefore, "Where do all the pins go to?" The greater number of them get lost, and there is no other domestic article where there is so much waste by loss. If every person in Europe lost a pin on every third day the daily loss would represent over \$5,000. In former days the number of men married in the manufacturing world, but as with most other manufacturing products, machinery has taken the place of men, and pins are now produced very much faster.

The machines are so perfect that they cut the wire of which the pins are made into pieces of the right length, head, point, polish and sort. They are then put into another machine which affixes them to paper in the rate of 50,000 to 100,000 per hour.

In the fourteenth century pins were made by hand. They were not carefully lost for a farthing change. The law permitted that they should only be sold in the first two days of January each year, in order that they might not become too common. It therefore became the custom for the makers of all classes to buy their year's stock of pins on these days, and the money given them for this purpose by their husbands or fathers was known as "pin money"—a phrase that has survived to the present day.

All banks, schools, courts and public offices were closed for the day, and many went forth holiday bound and enjoyed to the full the glorious sunny weather which was experienced all day long. Many stores, too, were closed, but the majority did not observe the day and were open as usual, though business was not up to the ordinary briskness, for others kept the holiday.

A large party left in the early morning for Banff, the greater part being the members of "Foresters" order, who had made the trip to Banff with them, and it was unusually busy all day long.

Officers Pardoned. In Calgary the police magistrate celebrated the day by giving full pardon to minor offenders, and they went free on the condition that they would precede His Majesty's birthday by one day. The theatres were well patronized, and at the Lyric and the Empire, which has matinees, there were large crowds, as also the moving picture houses.

The city parks were well crowded, and many children enjoyed the holiday. St. George's Island and the park at Bowmont being the favorites. The day brought little of the holiday nature to the newspaper man. ## WHITE STAR LINE IS NOT LOSING GROUND OVER TITANIC

During the year 1912, the company's five per cent. debenture bonds were retired, and it is planned to retire the same amount on August 1st of this year. The company has several large steamships under construction which will be added to its fleet, which now numbers 167 vessels. A six per cent. dividend was paid on the preferred stock.

## ALBERTA MAY FAIL TO GET TERMINAL ELEVATOR NOW

Only 3 Proposed to Be Built and These Will Go to Moose Jaw, Saskatoon and Brandon; Alberta People Slow in Taking Steps to Get One.

MORE NEEDED IN CENTRE OF WESTERN WHEAT BELT

Statement Made By Hon. Geo. Perley Yesterday May Mean That Calgary Has For Present Not Been Awarded One of the Elevators to Be Built.

OTTAWA, June 3.—The announcement made by Hon. Geo. Perley yesterday that terminal elevators are to be built immediately at Saskatoon and Moose Jaw, may have removed the chance of Alberta getting such an elevator for the present. The supplementary estimates only set aside money for three elevators and it is doubtful if more than the three could be completed in time to handle this year's grain and there would be no object in having a fourth half completed for the winter.

A reason which is thought in some parts to have possibly lost Alberta an elevator is the lack of interest which was taken in the matter. Of all the places in that province only Melfort appeared to have any interest in securing an elevator and though asked to locate a site for an elevator the people of Calgary took steps to that end only within the last few days which means that they may have lost the terminal elevator for the present.

Others declare at the same time that the terminal elevators will serve a greater purpose right in the heart of the wheat belt and Moose Jaw and Saskatoon may as easily be reached from many points in Alberta as some of the cities of Alberta themselves.

Spitzbergen's Future. Copenhagen this summer will entertain delegates representing Russia, Sweden, Norway and the United States, who will meet to decide the ownership of Spitzbergen, which, although uninhabited, has been prominent in the world's history as the point of departure for so many Arctic expeditions.

The question of ownership first came up in 1871, when Russia objected to its annexation of Sweden and Norway. Then in 1899 Germany opposed the claim of any one power to the land.
