### TO MAKE AND KEEP SAUSAGE

Cover With Lard to Keep Them Fresh

When the hogs are butchered I always superintend the trimming of the meat to make sausage, because the men folks are apt to be so tired of handling fresh meat that they want to do as little cutting as possible

Afer trimming the hams, shoulders and sides as closely as I dare I cut off all the meat from the backbones and spareribs that a sharp knife can Where angelic choirs attend find, then cut the meat from the jowls. Jowls are not fit to eat fresh, nor are they good when cured, but when cut in small pieces and added to the sausage meat, they increase the quantity of sausage and no one can tell the difference for this meat being ad-

The trimmings are cut into small pieces, washed in warm water and ground. A few tough ligaments will be found in the ground meat, but I watch out for them and pile them in a pan to be fed to the hens, a little at Then we shall too embark upon that-

When three or four pounds of sausage are ground I begin to add seasoning, as it is much easier to season a small quantity at a time than to mix seasoning in a greater mass.

To get the correct seasoning I have to cook a small piece and taste it. Red pepper and sage raised in the home garden make better seasoning than the manufactured articles, but where the home-raised product is not available, that bought from the grocer makes a good substitute. Add salt, black pepper, red pepper and sage according to taste and work thoroughly with the hands, to get the seasoning uniformly mixed with the

When all is ready sew up sacks two or three inches wide from thin muslin (I use flour sacks to make them) and pack the sausage in. Hang up to drip over night. Some of this can be smoked, and some may be put away to keep fresh for Spring and Summer use

To keep it fresh I put the sacks of sausage in a stove pan and let it become thoroughly hot. Then it is stor-
