No 6 Ward and a Hotel.

"Is there any need of a hotel in the sixth ward?" was the advertised title of Rev. C. E. McIntyre's sermon last evening. The reverend gentleman took his text sixth ward?" was the advertised title of Rev. C. E. McIntyre's sermon last evening. The reverend gentleman took his text from Danie!, i., 12, and dilated upon Danie! stalwart patriotism in standing up for principle. He strongly urged Christians to take a stand for that which was right in public aflairs. They should be patriots to the extent of seeking and voting for what they believed to be right, without regard to party affiliation. Speaking of the liquor traffic, he said all their efforts should be devoted to promote total abstinence for the individual and prohibition for the state. Some people said: "Look at the revenue we get from liquor." Not for a moment would he admit that the revenue derived should influence them to defend the traffic, because for every dollar of revenue received \$4 or \$5 had to be spent by the community to remedy its effects, to say nothing of the moral degradation which strong drink caused wherever sold and consumed. The preacher said he understood that a license application had heen made for No. 6 ward. He asserted that there was no need for a license there. that there was no need for a license there. A hotel was a place for travelers to stop

A hotel was a place for travelers to stop at, but there was no need of such a place in that suburb. A place for the sale of liquor depreciated the value of property in its neighborhood, and was sure to produce drunkenness and misery as well. Then, No. 6 ward was the most moral of all the wards. The arrests for drunkenness in a year could be counted on one's fingers. It was a ward in which there was little poverty of a kind requiring nublic assistance; but in the wards where liquor was sold there was plenty of poverty. nublic assistance; but in the wards where liquor was sold there was plenty of poverty. He warned his hearers, it they would not have their present happy condition through these evils reversed, to stand up in favor of the movement to impress the license commissioners with the fact that a license commissioners with the fact that a hotel license was not desired in that ward, and that it would be injurious to the resi-dents. He did not believe that the license commissioners would grant the license, but it was well for the people to be perpetually vigilant in guarding themselves against such a great evil.
