The brute has no advantage in regard of its relative weight in respect of the water over man, and yet the man perishes while the brute lives. Nevertheless, any man, any woman, any child, who can walk on the land may also walk in the water just as readily as any child, who can walk on the land may also walk in the water just as readily as the animal does, and that without any prior instructions in drilling whatever."
