ACCIDENT TO A LONDON MAN.

Brantford Expositor: A painful acci-
dent took place at the Grand Trunk shops this
(Monday) morning. While an employe
named J. Harvey, one of the London men,
was engaged in the shops, a large piece of
steel fell upon him, hitting him on the head,
and made a very serious cut. Mr. Harvey
was thrown to the ground where he lay for
a moment bleeding. Kindly hands were
soon at work and had him lifted and taken
care of. A hack was at once sent for, and
accompanied by fellow-workmen, the in-
jured man was taken to Dr. Henwood's
office, where the wound, which required sev-
eral stitches, was properly dressed, after
which Mr. Harvey was conveyed home to
London by train. Dr. Henwood says the
wound is a serious one. The flying piece of
steel which struck him made a star-shaped
wound three inches each way. The bone
has been denuded of skin, and the doctor
says it is too soon to say much about it.

THE ROYAL SECRETARY.

Mr. Peter Kerr, of the Scottish Clans,
Received by the Local Lodge.

**He Talks of the Work of the Order Since
Its Inception—A Musical Pro-
gramme Provided.**

Mr. Peter Kerr, of Boston, Mass., the
royal secretary of the order of Scottish
Clans, was tendered a reception in Somerset
Hall last night by the members of Clan
Fraser, No. 43. The turnout was large and
the evening proved a pleasant one for the
sons of the land of heather, their wives and
friends, for the programme was purely
Scottish, the musical portion comprising
songs by Miss Gilmour, Mr. Sim Fax; Miss
Mutch and Mr. Walter Young and a read-
ing by Dr. Gardiner. Besides the above,
several selections were given on the bag-
pipes by Mr. John Macgregor. Mr. E. R.
Cameron occupied the chair.

The feature of the programme was the
address by Mr. Kerr, which consisted chief-
ly of a review of the work of the clans. The
order, he said, was started on Nov. 30, 1878,
in St. Louis, Mo., with a very small mem-
bership, but since then it had been an
increasing power for good. Today the
active members numbered between 3,000
and 4,000, while during the past ten years
\$470,000 was paid to the widows and
orphans of deceased members, exclusive of
\$125,000 given to the treasurers for sick
benefits. Besides sick benefits and insur-
ance, many clans furnished skilled physicians
order being received with favor generally
among the Scotsmen. Many widows and
orphans had been assisted in these ways and
prevented from becoming public charges.

The royal secretary considered a man
criminally negligent who failed to make
such provision for his family when insur-
ance for \$1,000 could be obtained in the
Clans for less than 4 cents a day by a man
under 34 years of age. So the order was
always extending an invitation to men in
whose veins flowed the blood of old Scotia
to enlist under its banner and secure pro-
tection for those dependent upon them and
assist in a noble work. The organization
was consequently growing in popularity,
and the prospects for a successful future
were exceedingly bright.

At the conclusion of the programme
"Auld Lang Syne" was sung and hearty
votes of thanks were tendered Mr. Kerr
and the chairman.
