Britain Discriminated Against.
The Dominion Government Year
Book for last year is out, and from it
we find that during the fiscal year
ending June 30 last, Canada imported
from Great Britain goods to the value
of \$3,131,737, on which the duty col-
lected amounted to \$7,006,577. From
the United States we imported during
the same year goods to the value of
\$4,634,521, collecting thereon \$6,897,395
in duty. Not much loyalty in the
discrimination against the Mother-
land.

At last general election, when he had
the leadership of Sir John Macdonald
to conjure with, Mr. Joseph Marshall
only had a majority of 155.

The Change at Hand.

Senator McCallum, a Conservative
veteran and a life-long friend of Sir
John Macdonald, declares that the
Government will be defeated to-
morrow.

"Don," in Saturday Night, predicts
the overthrow of Tupperism.

The reports from Manitoba, the
Northwest and British Columbia, in-
dicate the complete rout of Tupper and
coercion.

Hon. W. S. Fielding, Premier of
Nova Scotia, sends to the press a
cheering report from the Eastern
Provinces.

Careful estimates as to the situation
in Quebec give Mr. Laurier a majority
of twelve or fifteen in that Province.

In Ontario the Government will be
overwhelmingly defeated.

We are able to make the positive an-
nouncement that one of the leaders of
the Cabinet, in a letter to a personal
friend, admitted that the Government
would be defeated.

London electors who have votes in
Middlesex, East Elgin or neighboring
ridings, should vote for Hyman, and
then, at the earliest moment, proceed
to the outlying places, and give their
votes. Let not a vote be left unpolled.

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
