ANOTHER THEATER FIRE. Chicago, April 2.- The Columbia Theater, one of the oldest playhouses in this city, was destroyed by fire Friday, entailing a total loss of \$190,000. The fire interrupted the progress of a rehearsal, and 20 men and women in costume were driven to the street in haste. The early part of the fire was marked with gallant rescues of girls employed in the laundry of the Iro-quois Club, where the flames started. Two firemen climbed the fire escape to the sixth floor and carried the women, who had grown hysterical, to a place of safety. THE FIRST REPORT.

Bushman Kop, Saturday, March 31. The British force, commanded by clonel Broadwood, consisting of the Colonel Tenth Hussars, Household Cavalry, two horse batteries and a force of mount-ed infantry, under Colonel Pilcher, which had been garrisoning Thaba N'chu, was obliged, in consequence of the near approach of a large force of Boers, to leave last night. Colonel Broadwood marched to the Bloemfontein waterworks south of the Modder, where he encamped at four this morning. At early dawn the camp was shelled by the enemy from a near point. Colonel Broadwood sent off a convoy with the batteries, while the rest of the force remained to act as a rear guard. The convoy arrived at a deep spruit, where the Boers concealed, and the entire body walked into ambush and was captured, together with six guns. The loss of life was not great, since most of the British had walked into the trap before a shot was fired. Gen. Colville's division, which left Bloemfontein early this morning, arrived here at noon, and he is now shelling the Boers. London, Monday, April 2 .- 4:30 a.m. The hope is expressed here that Gen.

Colville will recover the convoy and guns; but this is hardly likely in such a difficult country, and it is probable that the next news will be that, after a stiff fight, Gen. According to a special dispatch from Pretoria, dated yesterday, Lord Roberts has commenced his advance northward, The dispatch says that there are daily skirmishes, and that a big battle is imminent. This, however, may refer to the operations preceding engagement at Karee Siding, which has apparently cleared the way, as well as secured an advantageous position, whence the next op-erations may be conducted.

HOLDING OUT. London, March 31.-Lord Roberts today reported to the war office that he had received news from Col. Baden-Powell at Mafeking up to March 10, when the general health of the garrison and its spirits were good. The locally-made gun, searchlight and ammunition were working well; the food was holding out well, and the paper currency which the British commander

had issued was satisfactory. At the extreme west there are movements that seem to indicate the relief of Mafeking may not long be layed. Two thousand men and three batteries passed through Barkly West on Monday, and half as many more were expected to follow them.

OLIVIER'S 800 WAGONS. London, April 2.-The Times has the following from Mafeking, Basutoland, dated Friday, March 30.—Gen. Olivier has just passed Jamesberg Drift with a large body of men, four guns and 800 wagons. The column, which extended 30 miles, was accompanied by many women and children."

ROBERTS' MESSAGE RE JOUBERT Bloemfontein, Friday, March 30 .-Lord Roberts has sent the following dispatch to President Kruger: "Have just heard of the death of Gen. Jou-bert and desire to offer my sincere condolences upon the sad event. Would ask you to convey to Gen. Joubert's family an expression of my most respectful sympathy with their sad bereavement, and to assure them also from me that all ranks of her Majesty's forces share my feelings of deep regret at the sudden and untimely end of so distinguished a general who devoted his life to the service of his country, and whose personal gal-lantry was only surpassed by his humane conduct and chivalrous bearing under all circumstances.

the Delagoa Bay Railway arbitration tribunal.' OFF TO ST. HELENA. Cape Town, March 31. - The first batch of prisoners started today for

St. Helena The transportation of the prisoners o St. Helena is arousing the anger of the Boers, who threaten to retaliate by sending the British prisoners to Koomatipoort, reputed to be the worst fever-den in South Africa.

The departure of the British transports with the Boer prisoners has been delayed in consequence of the increased sickness among the prisoners. Three died today and 12 have died during the week. Arrangements are being made to prevent overcrowding. The prisoners do not complain of their treatment or their food. Many of Gen. Cronje's men when captured were completely worn out with the hardships they had undergone and little strength was left them for fighting disease.

### How 'Twas Done.

THE TURNING MOVEMENT. Bloemfontein, March 31.-The Boer position yesterday (at Karee Siding station) was one of great natural strength. Only the turning movement of Gen. French and Major Le Gallais, the latter commander of the mounted infantry, on either flank, insured the British success. The shape of the kopjes was irregular. The Boers' right flank consisted of a long hill, with wooded sides, connected with the main position by a long, low ridge, thickly wooded. The rest of the position, towards the left, consisted kopjes, all connected by a high ridge. Major Le Gallais moved around the Boer left and engaged them first, freely using his Vickers-Maxims, and gradually forcing the Boers towards the center, where they made a good stand. Major Le Gallais was unable to move until late in the day, while Gen.French moved early. The latter made a wide detour towards the rear of the Boers, but was unable to complete his movement before the Boers perceived his intention, and abandoned the position, They retired in good order between Gen. French and Major Le Gallais
