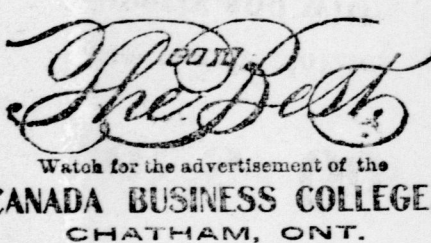

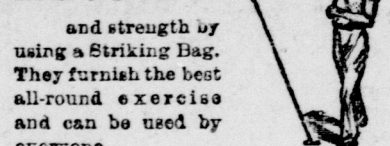

Toronto, Oct. 10, 8 p.m.—The storm
development which was indicated off
the United States Atlantic coast last
night has now taken place and a dis-
turbance apparently of importance is
situated to the southward of Nova
Scotia. Heavy rain continues in the
Maritime Provinces, but elsewhere in
Canada the weather remains fine. Min-
imum and maximum temperatures:
Victoria, 46-66; Kamloops, 38-53; Cal-
gary, 32-54; Qu'Appelle, 38-54; Winni-
peg, 44-58; Port Arthur, 36-53; Parry
Sound, 35-55; Toronto, 40-60; Ottawa,
36-55; Montreal, 35-59; Quebec, 40-48;
Halifax, 62-64.

Local temperature—The highest and
lowest readings of the thermometer at
the observatory on Wednesday, Oct. 10,
were 51 and 41 degrees.
Today (Thursday) the sun rose at
6:27 a.m., and sets at 5:43 p.m. The
moon rises at 7:51 p.m., and sets at
10:15 a.m.

—Detroit Free Press: Delegate Mc-
Leod, of the Street Railway Employees
association, is indignant at what he
terms "the basest ingratitude he has
ever heard of since he has been walk-
ing delegate. McLeod says that last
November Motorman Fred Seccomb (a
former Londoner) of the Fourteenth
avenue line, was in charge of the car
which, through no fault of his own,
collided with a car which had been
placed on the wrong track without
lights, near the corner of Western
avenue and Fourteenth. The only person
injured to any extent was the motorman,
and for several weeks Seccomb was
laid up in a hospital. All winter
and summer he had been physically
incapacitated, and as a result of the
accident one leg is now shorter than
the other, and he will be lame for
life. Yesterday he appeared at Mr.
McLeod's office and stated that he was
better and felt that he could run his
car as well as ever. Mr. McLeod ac-
companied him to the street railway
company's office, and asked that Sec-
comb be given his old job back again.
They were curtly told that there was
no place for him in any capacity. Mr.
McLeod says that he will bring the
case before the board of review and
ask if he loses it there it will go to
arbitration.
