# PTE. W. J. HYMAN

Had Pneumonia and Enteric Fever, sults. But Is Now Fully Recovered.

In a letter received by Mrs. W. T. Hyman, of Oxford street, from her son, Pte. W. J. Hyman, of the first contingent he says:

"I suppose you will be getting uneasy about me, having heard that I was in the hospital. But you need not be, as I am as well as I ever was to my life. On the 4th of August we were withdrawn from Springs, and entrained for down country, as we supposed, but after about 70 miles we detrained at a place called Wolf Hoek, and the next day were sent to join the column in pursuit of General Dewet. We were then in the Free State, but in a few days we crossed Vaal again. I got soaking wet, and the next day, while in the rear guard, became sick, and lagged behind, Sergt. Macbeth saw that I was very sick, and stayed with me. After two days we came to a place on the railway called Banks. Here we reported sick and were sent to Krugersdorp hospital, where I was put to bed, and had to stay there for 14 days with pneumonia and a slight attack of enteric fever. When I became convalescent. I was sent on here to a convalescent camp. Macbeth was sent down here, after only two days at Krugersdorp, but as he is not here now I suppose he is in Pretoria, with the regiment, to which place I am expecting to be sent at any moment. I cannot speak too highly of the treatment I received while in hospi-tal and here. Here there are seven of us in a large marquee tent, which is double. We have spring beds and the Mnen and everything else is as clean as a new pin. There is a rumor
