NAILED IN A BOX!

Dying Man Discovered on an Ocean Liner

After a Fifteen-Day Voyage.

New York, Dec. 4.—While stevedores were unloading the liner Palatia at the pier in Hoboken on Monday, a large, oblong packing case struck against the dock. One end of it was broken off and a man fell from the box on the wharf. The stevedores, badly frightened, ran away. The foreman, Max Peterson, called for help. The ship's surgeon was summoned. He saw that the man was still alive, although unconscious. A hurry call was sent for an ambulance, and the man was taken to St. Mary's Hospital. He is extremely

weak and emaciated and cannot live. The Palatia is a slow steamer, and had been fifteen days on the way here from Hamburg, having arrived on Sunday. There was nothing in the box to identify the man. He appeared to be about 32 years old, had brown hair, and it is believed he is a German. It is supposed that he was boxed up by friends in Hamburg, who hoped to have him smuggled across as freight. In the box were three or four loaves of bread, and a bottle of whisky, but no water. The man evidently had been overcome for want of air and water. In his efforts to escape he had managed to pry off a part of one of the boards.

STRATHCONA STILL VERY ILL

The Canadian High Commissioner Unable to Leave His Bed—Quiet Marriage of Duke of Hamilton—Uniform for Reporters.

London, Dec. 4.—Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, the Canadian high commissioner, who has been confined to his house with a severe cold for some time, is still seriously ill. He cannot leave his bed, and is unable to attend to any business. Several specialists have been consulted by Sir William Broadbent, who is attending the patient, and they have forbidden visits by anyone excepting members of his family.

DUKE QUIETLY MARRIED.

London, Dec. 4.—The Duke of Hamilton was quietly married at Salisbury today, to Miss Nina Poon. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Canon, who is a friend of the duke. The duke is a bachelor of 35, and the bride is 24. They were married at noon. Only half a dozen near relatives were present.

UNIFORM FOR REPORTERS.

London, Dec. 4.—The military authorities are taking step with a view to adopting more stringent regulations in regard to war correspondents. It is intimated that the number of press representatives at the seat of war, while a list is to be kept at the war office of those who are officially considered as war correspondents, the authorities have resolved that in any future campaign newspaper men at the front shall wear a uniform.

OFFERED QUEEN A PENSION.

A dispatch to the London Express from Victoria says it is stated that King Alexander offered Queen Draga an annual pension of £14,000 if she would consent to a divorce by mutual agreement, and that the queen refused.

NEW VICEROY FOR IRELAND.

It is now almost certain that Lord Dudley will succeed Cadogan as viceroy of Ireland. This puts an end to rumors that the Duke of Marlborough would receive the post.

COMMENT ON THE MESSAGE.

The Daily News says: "It shows a bold man struggling with the devil of party intrigue, and is in refreshing contrast to the spread-eagleism of the earlier period of American jingoism. President Roosevelt is holding himself very high ideal of conduct in public life and we have no doubt he will rise to it."

THE WESTMINSTER GAZETTE CONSIDERS
