CONSUMPTION IS CONTAGIOUS

New Plan of Notification by Physicians Put Into Practice.

Toronto, July 25. - When the provincial board of health met last the secretary urged the necessity of inducing the medical men of the province to consider consumption as a contagious disease, and notify the department of every case. The board heartily ineverywhere were requested to make the notifications desired.

The first fruits of that proposal are diseases in the province for the month parent object is to pass along the sea of June.
