Paris, April 15. - A dispatch to the semi-official Temps from Constantinople says the French ambassador, M. Constans, has received an imperial irade making a complete and definite settlement of the French claims, It gives an indemnity of \$7,000,000 for the controversy over the Damascus-Nazrib Railroad and insures continuous French control of the road, and also accords as damages \$320,000 to the French company operating the quays

The principal feature of the irade is an agreement to use a third of a loan of \$12,000,000 for ordering warships and artillery from French firms. The latter feature gives much satisfaction here, as it was sharply opposed by Turkey, with the concurrence of the German ambassador.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, April 14.-Mr. R. R. Gamey was the only speaker at this afternoon's sitting of the House. He spoke for an hour and a half, concluding his address, in which he dealt at length with New Ontario's needs with regard to the mining, lumber, agricultural and water power resources. He made a much better impression than his unfortunate opening yesterday promised, steering clear of personalities, and showing an able grasp of his subject. Before the House rose Premier Whitney informed G. P. Graham, acting Opposition leader, that he hoped the budget debate would be closed on Tuesday afternoon, and that on Tuesday evening the estimates could be taken up and be dismissed as business would allow until they were all passed. As to the Easter adjournment, it seemed reasonable to him that when the House adjourned on the day before Good Friday it should remain in recess until a inasmuch as Rojestvensky had suc- sensation was caused this morning by week from the following Monday. Grand Calumet Mining Company of Algoma had sent 2,000 tons of zine ore to a foreign refinery and immediately the Government put a duty of \$5 a ton on zinc ore. There was no plant in Ontario to refine it, yet the Government practically refused to allow the ore o be shipped out of the country. Ontario was not refining a pound of her own ore. It was all being refined

in the United States.

The Province had also valuable iron deposits, but no place in which to re-fine the ore. The Lake Superior Com-pany at the Soo had in consequence to ring in 165,000 tons of American ore. Mr. Gamey said some encouragement should be given towards the magnetic separation of ores. Eastern Ontario had immense deposits, which were worthless unless a separation process was at the disposal of the owners of

these deposits. Concluding, Mr. Gamey suggested several changes necessary for the development of New Ontario. He urged that mining offices should be establishsible. At present they were anything but equitable. A bounty should be given to encourage the refining of copper, iron and nickel ores into the finsay offices, where Government tests of minerals could be made.
