Results for 1911

ASSURANCES—New assurances were issued and assurances revived amounting to \$7,136,952, exceeding those issued and revived in the preceding year by \$610,687. The assurances in force at the close of the year totalled \$34,518,000.

INCOME—The cash income from premiums and interest was \$1,545,527.04, an increase of \$174,966.66 over that of 1910.

BENEFITS—The payments to policyholders, covering death losses, surrender values, profits, annuities, etc., amounted to \$287,720.31, exceeding those of the previous year by \$50,311.77. The rate of mortality continued favorable, the death losses being only 66% of the expected.

ASSETS—The total assets were increased to \$7,095,442.79, showing a gain for the year of \$948,112.80. An average rate of interest of 6.81% was realized on the invested funds.

RESERVES—The reserves on 76% of the assurances were valued on the stringent basis of 3% interest, the annuities and remaining assurances on a 3½% interest basis. The total reserves amounted to \$5,509,062, an increase of \$759,637 over those of the previous year.

SURPLUS—The surplus earned in the year was \$256,098.29. Of this amount there was added to the policyholders' net surplus fund \$144,648.49, increasing it to \$781,550.49. The balance was utilized in payment of profits and dividends, in providing special reserves, etc.

PROGRESS—The substantial progress being made yearly in all departments is evidenced by the following comparison of results for the past four years:

NO MORE WORK ON NEWMARKET CANAL

Borden Government Announces That the Construction Will Be Discontinued.

MUCH PROGRESS MADE

Sir Alan Aylesworth, Late Minister of Justice, and Member For South York, Comments on the Decision.

Ottawa, Jan. 14.—The Government, on the recommendation of Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways and canals, has decided to abandon altogether the Newmarket Canal, connecting the town of Newmarket with Lake Simcoe via the Holland River. On the canal there has been spent to date a little over half a million dollars, and to complete it and provide for conservation works the departmental engineers estimate that fully as much more would be required.

Mr. Cochrane, in his recommendation to the council, stated that in the opinion of engineering experts the commercial value of the canal would not warrant the expenditure of the further amount required to complete it, and that in addition it was doubtful if sufficient water to operate it could be maintained at a cost at all commensurate with the traffic benefits resulting.

The decision of the Government will, of course, raise a storm of protest in North York, and it is understood that Mr. Armstrong, the Conservative member for the riding, is energetically expressing his disapproval.

In 1906 by a strong deputation of both Liberals and Conservatives, including Mr. Herbert Lennox, Conservative M. P. for North York. The original estimate of the cost, prepared by the departmental engineers, was only \$328,000, and the undertaking was begun by the late Government on the assumption that this estimate was correct. The final estimate of the total cost, as submitted to Parliament last March, was \$1,000,000, with a total expenditure at that date of \$459,332. The departmental engineers then showed that the question of water supply presented no serious engineering difficulties.

It is stated that Hon. Mr. Cochrane also has in view the abandonment of the proposed further extension of the Trent Canal from Lake Simcoe to Georgian Bay via the Severn River. Sir Alan Aylesworth's view.

Toronto, Jan. 15.—Sir Alan Aylesworth, former minister of justice, member for North York, and chief promoter of the Newmarket Canal, when seen at the King Edward Hotel, what their motive could be unless it is to constitute the nearly finished canal a perpetual monument of Government folly. The canal, you know, runs for nearly a mile alongside of the Grand Trunk Railway, and a great underground work like this, dry as a ditch, would be made to advertise to every one passing that way the folly of the Government which undertook to build the canal.

"But this will prove a boomerang, for I suppose that some half a million dollars have been spent on the canal. It is now nearly finished. I have not a particle of doubt but what the amount of money the Government will be required to pay the contractor in damages because of the cancellation of the contract will greatly exceed the amount which it would be necessary to expend to finish the work. The contractor probably expected a profit from the undertaking, and will make allowances for this in his bill for damages."

"The canal scheme had been entered into before ever I became interested in North York particularly. It was not till October, 1905, that I came before the electors of North York as a candidate for the House of Commons. In the preceding year a monster delegation waited on the Government at Ottawa to press for the building of the canal. The agitation was purely a non-political affair. As many Conservatives as Liberals were interested. Haughton Lennox and J. Herbert Lennox were head and front of the movement."

A Record Deputation. "A photograph was taken of the delegation standing on the steps of the Parliament Buildings, Ottawa. There were three or four hundred men in it. I remember seeing this picture at Ottawa. It was regarded as a curiosity, as the delegation was one of the largest, if not the largest, which had ever waited on the Government up to that time."

"Every municipality in the riding of North York, and some adjacent ones in other ridings, passed resolutions indorsing the scheme, and sent delegates to Ottawa."

"With the completion of the canal, freight rates on the railways in the vicinity would, of course, come down at once. The people, in agitation for the construction of the canal, I believe, did so with a single eye to the building up of the northern part of their country, and politics never entered into the matter at all."

A total expenditure of \$1,000,000 was the estimate for the Newmarket Canal, and it was to have been completed in 1910, having been begun in 1906.

I was on the Lake Simcoe level, and the total rise between Holland Landing and Newmarket was forty-three feet, which was to be overcome by three locks.

A contract for the construction of section 1 was let to the Lake Simcoe Dredging Company in August, 1906. They abandoned it in 1907 and it was taken out of their hands in May, 1908. The York Construction Company has the contract for the second section after taking it over from Russell, Dill & Lothian.

Work Done So Far. The total value of the work done and materials delivered to March 31, 1911, amounted to \$339,636.82. Lock and dam No. 3 and Green Lane bridge are finished. Sixty per cent. of lock and dam No. 2 is built, and the excavation for the pit of lock and dam No. 1 is almost out. The Newmarket dock is one-half built, and up to March 31, 1910, there had been spent on it the sum of \$459,000. The work was divided into two sections, and on the second of these, the Holland River section, \$139,570 has been spent. This is the section nearest Toronto.

The scheme was to construct a canal from Newmarket via the Holland River to Lake Simcoe, and so connect York County with the Trent Canal system.

FOUR LOSE LIFE BY LAMP EXPLOSION

Two Women and Two Children Perish in a Boston Tenement Fire.

[Canadian Press.] Boston, Jan. 15.—Two women and two children lost their lives last night when a lamp exploded in their attic bedroom in a three and a half story tenement block in the west end, setting fire to the block. The victims, who were suffocated before they could be rescued, were Mrs. Katherine Connors, aged 50 years, an invalid and a widow; her daughter, Mrs. Mary Logue, aged 25 years, also a widow, and the two children of the latter, John, aged 2½ years, and Julia, aged 13 months.

To a crowded audience, Rev. Canon Tucker, of St. Paul's Cathedral, preached the anniversary services of the London City Mission on Saturday night. Among the conversions which have been made in the little mission since it was opened a year ago, there have been an ex-detective, a white slave dealer, one doctor, two Chinese, one Jew, and an ex-baseball player of Chicago, who have professed a faith in the Christian gospel, and have gone out to lead changed lives from the little hall on King street, opposite the fish market.

A number of young girls leading wayward lives have also been reclaimed through the instrumentality of the mission.

"The one fact in all life," said Canon Tucker in his sermon Saturday night, "is that all must die. The longest life comes to an end, and every life has its end. It is a question of being happy or unhappy for all eternity. As the present depends on what the past has been, so will the future depend on what the present is today."

DANGER IN TEA LEFT STANDING

Father and Son Made Ill By Drinking Beverage Left in Pot Four Days.

Baltimore, Md., Jan. 15.—The cause of the illness of Edward J. White and his 7-year-old son, Kenneth, of Round Top, Baltimore County, which attracted considerable attention, has been solved by Mr. White himself. He said that he has learned just what caused the illness of himself and little boy, not having depended upon the police to make the investigation.

"I have found," said he, "that we were made ill by drinking tea that had been standing in a teapot for four days. The teapot had been knocked off the pot in some places, and when the tea came in contact with it, it was poisoned. I heated this tea up and gave it to my son and took some myself, and that's what made us ill. I'm all right now, and will go back to work, and my boy is getting along nicely."

This discovery made by Mr. White hits the suspicion of attended poison. His wife, Mrs. Blanche White, who denied that she gave her husband anything that would cause his illness, is still at the home of her mother, Mr. White said that he is willing for her to be taken to her home, providing she believes the wife's story, and that he will be back with her.
