

THE "COME-BACK" DIDN'T COME.

It happened that Dr. John Edward Jones, the American consul-general at Genoa, was returning on the same train from an inspection of the consulate at Naples. He hurried to Mr. Comisky's compartment, and found that he was suffering from an acute attack of indigestion with marked cardiac symptoms. Dr. Jones gave what assistance he was able, and remained beside the Chicago magnate until Rome was reached, and Mr. Comisky was removed to a hotel.

Late tonight, Mr. Comisky was re-

ported as being in an improved condition and resting comfortably.
