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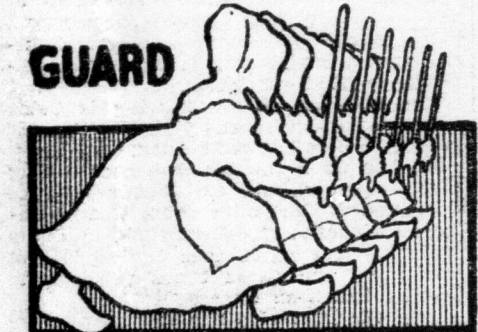

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LONDON AND DISTRICT

Address by Mr. Matheson. — Special services of an interesting nature were conducted at Adelaide Street Baptist Church Monday evening, including a strong address by William Matheson, evangelist at the City Mission. CORRESPONDENCE

A Reply to Captain Murphy. To the Editor of The Advertiser: Capt. Murphy takes me to task for speaking disrespectfully of Lord Aberdeen. He mentions Lady Aberdeen's visit to London. I don't remember saying anything about her. As regards Lord Aberdeen's private life, I know nothing. He may have very many amiable qualities. I can only speak of him in regard to his public actions as affecting the people of Ireland. And if a man commits a wrong against the public it does not lessen his guilt if he were an earl and a viceroy ten times over.

Your correspondent objects to Lord Aberdeen being called the chum of a lawbreaker. How, then, does he explain the attitude of Lord Aberdeen towards Larkin and the lawbreakers in the Belfast troubles of 1907? In addition, every time Larkin has been put in prison Lord Aberdeen immediately pardons him. If the above does not satisfy Capt. Murphy, would he like to be reminded of Lord Aberdeen's refusal to aid his own church (I, e.,

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the Presbyterian Church of Ireland) in their efforts to trace the McCann children when they were kidnapped as a result of the operations of the Ne Temere decree of the Roman Church? His cowardly, servile conduct on that occasion lost him the respect which otherwise was his as viceroy of Ireland.

Capt. Murphy's discussion of my use of the term "Protestant capital," etc. is a mere quibble. May I also dwell on a technical point, and remind you that I am misquoted? I did not use the term "Catholic capital." I wrote "Roman Catholic capital." It goes on to say that my "method of reasoning would lead to the absurd conclusion that there is a Catholic arithmetic, etc." In Canada one would almost believe there is a Roman Catholic arithmetic, when Roman Catholic children are not allowed to learn this subject (and others) in the public schools of this country. Capt. Murphy's statement respecting the relatively large number of Protestants in Ireland who are Nationalists is too absurd to require contradiction.

He also blames me for attributing the crimes of particular individuals to a whole body of people. One of my examples was the wrecking of the McCann family by a Roman Catholic priest. I may be wrong in stating that many Roman Catholics sympathize with this outrage. But I have yet to hear of one who has the courage to say that the priest did wrong on that occasion.

Capt. Murphy thinks that I should not cast reflections on the Nationalists of Ireland. He wears the King's uniform. If he were that uniform for one hour on the Falls Road (Nationalist district of Belfast), and if at the end of the time were still alive to tell the tale, I wonder what language he would use to describe those "loyal and patriotic" citizens of that district.

He chides me for my bigotry and points out among other things that my letter will not further the cause of "peace on earth." Probably he sees the greater efficacy of the speeches of Father Vaughan and the workings of the Ne Temere decree in bringing about this desired result. Yours,

The City Hall.
There seems to be a general opinion among the citizens that it would be very unwise to proceed with the building of an expensive city hall at the present time. With the expenditure of \$700,000 on the Port Stanley Railway and the expenditure of \$400,000 on storm sewers, besides additions to the Collegiate Institute and the Industrial School. It seems the height of folly to enter into further expenditure of half a million on a city hall, especially as the city officials have better quarters now than they have

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ever had before. I do not think the ratepayers would have voted for the \$250,000 bylaw last January, if they had had any idea it was to be spent in purchasing land for the Federal Square. The general opinion was that the Government would buy the land and the city would erect the buildings. The cost of the land to the city will be over \$200,000, leaving very little on hand to start the building of a city hall. The best thing to do is to postpone building a city hall for five or ten years, and in the meantime to rent the McCormick factory building from the company at a nominal price. The city could then lease the building for factory purposes to new industries, such as the C. N. W. Shoe Company, etc. I understand that the McCormick Company have the right to remove their present factory next year, although they have been paid \$125,000 for the land. Yours, etc.,

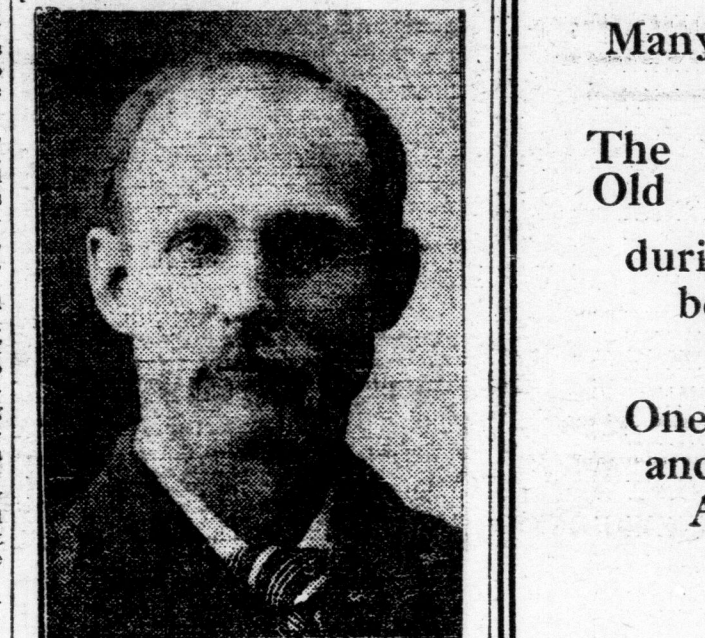

MARCHESE DEAD

She afterwards taught in Paris, then in Cologne, and later returned to Vienna, which she left finally in 1881 to establish herself in Paris, where she had since lived.

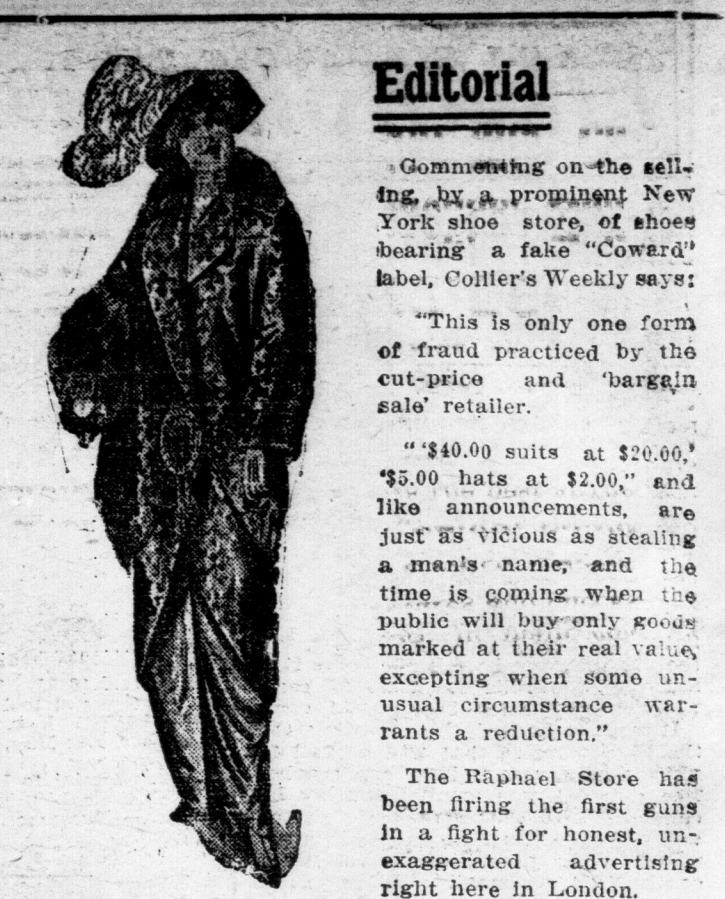
