NEW BUILDING WILL BE FIREPROOF ONE
Safety To Be First Consideration in Remodeled Dominion Savings Building.

Plans have been practically completed for the reconstruction of the burned Dominion Savings Building.
The first consideration will be the making of the new building as fireproof as possible. Cement and steel construction will be installed, the floors, roof, elevator shaft and staircases being planned to be of cement, with steel supporting beams and columns.
The top floor will be entirely given to offices in the new building, the lodge rooms and dining hall in the old building being eliminated. In this manner a large number of offices will be provided, and the accommodation of the building considerably enlarged.
The elevator shaft will be inclosed in fireproof walls with fireproof doors, and the elevators will be the most modern that can be purchased. The stairways will be much narrower than the old, and will follow the elevator shaft.
The Northern Life Assurance Company will have the entire north half of the first floor. Formerly this company was in the southeast corner of the second floor. New vaults will be built, and a large suite of rooms provided.
The Dominion Savings and Investment Society will have additional safety deposit vaults on the ground floor, and it is probable that the vaults throughout will be remodelled.
Provision is to be made for the addition of another story to the building in case there is a demand for more office space. At the present time with the new offices that are to be provided, the owners say there would not be a demand for additional floor.
According to the plans, the building will be modern in every respect, and as completely fireproof.

TRAVEL BROADENS MIND
SAYS S. J. RADCLIFFE
Normal School Principal Gives Travel Talk to Mothers' Club.

Perhaps a more enthusiastic and receptive audience could not have been found in London last evening than that gathered in Chesley Avenue School, when principal Radcliffe, of the Normal School, spoke under the auspices of the Mothers' Club, on "Travel As a Means of Education." Mr. W. T. Strong, of the board of education, presided, and in introducing the speaker, paid a warm tribute to Mr. Radcliffe's worth as a teacher, and also complimented the members of Chesley Avenue Mothers' Club upon their enterprise. He did not know of a more energetic body of women in London.

Value in Travel.
Mr. Radcliffe stated that the value of travel had been discussed some 300 years ago when Montaigne claimed that the training of the English schools was inadequate. The students learned mathematics, but lacked diplomacy, and were narrow-minded. He advocated sending the young to see other people and other lands. Yet Mr. Radcliffe believed that without a knowledge of literature, history and geography, travel in itself would be superficial. To appreciate the beauties of foreign lands, and the treasures which they contained, it was necessary to know something of them beforehand.
He believed travel was especially beneficial to the Anglo-Saxon races, who were inclined to think themselves the "saith" of the world. Canadians and Englishmen and Americans needed to study the people of other lands in their own native environment, and thus to become more tolerant of their customs and beliefs. Travel also made the countries one read about much more real.

Tells of Trip.
In a most delightful way Mr. Radcliffe discussed several of the places which he had visited last year. Italy appealed to him as being a most ideal country in which to live. Besides its natural beauties, it contained some of the finest art relics in the world, and a most fascinating history. Germany and Russia, he compared as being two of the greatest powers of Europe. There were vast differences between them. In Germany the majority of the people were intellectual and read the classics. In Russia 88 per cent of the populace could not read, while the other 12 per cent lived in luxury. Some very interesting experiences were told by the speaker during his address, with delightful word-pictures of Warsaw, St. Petersburg, Berlin and other world-famous cities.
A very hearty vote of thanks was tendered to Mr. Radcliffe for his instructive address, and also to the Normal School Girls' Club, which had presented, and under the direction of Mr. C. E. Percy, favored with several excellent choruses. A solo by Miss Campbell, and a violin selection, Schumann's, by Mr. Schumann, also added to the pleasure of the program. Mr. Jones was most enthusiastically applauded and was forced to respond with an encore.

JUDGMENT IS RESERVED

Hodgins-Hudson Assault Charge Laid Over Until May 7.

Judgment on the assault charge preferred by James H. Hodgins, J. P. reeve of London Township, against Henry Hudson and the other defendants, made by Hudson against Mr. Hodgins was reserved until Thursday, May 7. The cases were tried yesterday in the county police court before Squibb, J. C. Hodgins, and the other defendants. The alleged assault occurred last Saturday at Ilderton.
When Henry Hudson was called to the box he asserted that the reeve had struck him and kicked him. He admitted that he had struck Mr. Hodgins after he had been hit and suffered several alleged injuries. Mr. Hodgins, he stated, had declared that he had perjured himself in two previous suits in which he had been a principal.
Several witnesses were called to testify that the reeve had not hit or kicked Hudson, and several others as strongly asserting that both of them were striking at each other.

TELLS "LIFE'S ESSENTIALS"

Rev. W. C. Riddiford Addresses Police Association on That Subject.

Rev. W. C. Riddiford, of Esorton Street Baptist Church, addressed a large gathering of the London Police Association in the Y. M. C. A. yesterday afternoon. The subject of his address was "Life's Essentials."
Taking as the basis of his remarks, "In Him was life, and the life was the light of man," the speaker declared that in order to make good policemen it was necessary to have a knowledge of Christ, commit Christ's teaching, and transmit his teachings.
Continuing, the preacher asserted that the life of Christ brought to earth was the only life that gave any light on social conditions and all the problems which had to do with man in general. Rev. Mr. Riddiford illustrated his remarks with actual experiences.

London has been treated to a wide variety of temperature during the past 30 days that constituted the month of April. Miss Mercury has been extremely skittish at times, as proven by a glance at the weather report for the month. The highest spot attained was on the 28th when the "quick stuff" in the tube climbed to 81 degrees. The low point was 16 degrees on the 5th. During the month, the weather man dished up an assortment of weather that contained a week at least of the favorite kind of everyone. There was hot, cold and milder weather with rain, and sunshine alternating, although there was a feeling that the wet periods exceeded the dry by a considerable margin.
Old Jup. Pluv. showered 2.92 inches of rain during the month, while the snow-fall aggregated 6 1/2 inches.

MAY ELECT A LONDONER

London Methodist Conference May Install City Divine as Head.

The thirty-first session of London Methodist Conference will convene in the Central Methodist Church, Sarnia, on Wednesday afternoon, June 3, and continuing until Tuesday, June 9.
It is not improbable that a Londoner will be elected to succeed Rev. W. C. H. McMillan, as president of the conference. The name of Rev. G. N. Hazen has been mentioned. Ministers attending the conference will occupy leading pulpits of Sarnia and Port Huron on Sunday, June 7. Rev. G. W. Dewey, formerly of "The Times of Hoffman," "Night of Stars," their voices blending with beautiful effect. Miss Myrtle Hicks revealed a mezzo-soprano voice, pure and sweet in tone, in two short numbers.
Woodman's song cycle, "A Song Legend," found excellent expression by Miss Pauline Fitzgerald, whose full contralto, strong and pure, made the composition one of the features of an enjoyable program. Miss Luta Laymon's rendition of Mary Turner Salter's "Cry of Rachel," was well conceived and excellently executed.
While rather light in timbre, Cecil Carling's baritone solo, with double ladies quartette, proved a most acceptable offering. The couple quartette also offered Cowen's "Bridal Chorus," and in response to continued demands for an encore, offered another number with fine effect. The ensemble tone secured was exceptionally good. E. A. Webster rendered Saint-Saens' bass solo, "The Journey of King John," and Miss Gladys Andrus revealed herself as an accomplished pianist in her rendition of Liszt's Hungarian Rhapsody, No. 12. Miss Dorothy Mitchell and Mr. Jordan offered the "Rakoczy March" (Liszt) in piano duet.
Miss McCormick is a dramatic reader of considerable skill, as she demonstrated in her two numbers, a tensely dramatic scene from Klein's "The Lion and the Mouse," and a light humorous offering, "The Abandoned Elopement," by Joseph Lincoln.

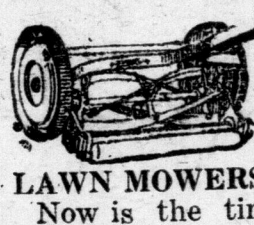
