

ENDURE AND FIGHT MOTTO FOR ALLIES

Proclamation Removing Seat
of Government From
Paris to Bordeaux.

CITY DEFENCE ASSURED

But More Is Necessary To Re-
tain Mastery of Actions
—No Truce.

PARIS, Sept. 3.—1:34 a.m.—The proclamation issued tonight removing the seat of Government to Bordeaux, is as follows:

"Frenchmen: For several weeks our heroic troops have been engaged in fierce combats with the enemy. The courage of our soldiers has won for them a number of marked advantages, but the pressure of the German forces has constrained us to retire. This situation imposes on the President of the republic and the Government a painful decision.

"To watch over the national safety the public authorities are obliged to leave for the moment the city of Paris. Under the command of its eminent chief, the French army, full of courage and spirit, will defend the capital and its patriotic population against the invader. But the war must be pursued at the same time in the rest of the French territory.

"None of Armies Broken.
"The struggle for the honor of the nation and the reparation of violated rights will continue without peace or truce without a stop or a failure. None of our armies has been broken.

"If some of them have suffered only too evident losses of the ranks have been filled up from the waiting reserve forces, while the calling out of another class of reserves brings us tomorrow new resources in men and energy.

"Endure and Fight," such should be the motto of the allied armies. English, Russians, Belgians and French.

"Endure and fight," while on the sea our allies aid us to cut the enemy's communications with the world.

"Endure and fight," while the Russians continue to carry a decisive blow to the heart of the German Empire.

"It is for the Government of this republic to direct this resistance to the very end and to give to this formidable struggle all its vigor and efficiency; it is indispensable that the Government retain the mastery of its own actions. On the demand of the military authorities, the Government therefore transfers its seat momentarily to a point of the territory whence it may remain in constant relations with the rest of the country. It invites the members of Parliament not to remain distant from the Government in order to form, in the face of the enemy, with the Government and its colleagues, a group of national unity.

"The Government does not leave Paris without having assured a defence of the city and its entrenched camp by all means in its power. It knows it has not the need to recommend to the admirable Parisian population a calm resolution and sangfroid, for it shows every day it is equal to its greatest duties.

"Frenchmen, let us all be worthy of these tragic circumstances. We shall gain a final victory and we shall gain it by uniting will, endurance and tenacity. A nation that will not perish and which to live retreats before neither suffering nor sacrifice is sure to vanquish."

"Wounded to be Removed.
LONDON, Sept. 3.—3 a.m.—A dispatch to the Chronicle from Paris states that orders have been issued for the removal of all wounded from Paris to Rennes and Nantes.

BRITISH CAVALRY ENGAGE ENEMY WITH DISTINCTION

Continuous Fighting Along Almost Whole Line of Battle—
French Continue in Offensive and Gain in
Lorraine.

LONDON, Sept. 3.—12:10 a.m.—The official press bureau has issued the following statement:

"Continuous fighting has been in progress along almost the whole line of battle. The British cavalry engaged with distinction the cavalry of the enemy and brushed them back and captured ten guns.

"The French army has continued the offensive and gained ground in the Lorraine district. In other regions of the war the Russian army is investing Königsberg. The Russian victory, which is complete at Lemberg, has already been announced."

NO HOSTILE TROOPS SEEN IN NORTHWEST SECTION

PARIS, Sept. 2.—3:30 p.m.—"In the north there are no signs of hostile troops at Arras, Lille, Bethune, Douai and Lens," according to an official announcement made today.

"Parts of several German army corps in Belgium," the statement continues, "are moving eastward into Germany."

The official statement adds:

"In Lorraine our advance continues on the right bank of the Saône. In the south the situation is unchanged. In Upper Alsace the Germans appear to have left. Before Belfort there is only a thin curtain of troops.

"Another German cavalry corps has pushed on as far as the line from Soissons to Amiens. The region of Reims and the Meuse the enemy is inactive."

AUSTRIA WHIPPED IN THREE PLACES AND ON THE RUN

Austria has suffered three decisive defeats, being routed with tremendous loss of men, guns, ammunition and provisions in separate engagements with the Russians, Serbians and Montenegrins. Official dispatches from Russia and Serbia, and an unofficial dispatch from Montenegro, tell of the Austrians being on the run and hotly pursued.

Russian troops have besieged the fortifications around Lemberg, the capital of Galicia, and on Tuesday forced the Kaiser's allies to retreat in disorder, leaving behind marks of artillery, with many killed and wounded. Many were taken prisoners. The bulk of five Austrian corps were engaged in this encounter.

Serbia faced an army of 200,000 Austrians at Jadar, and forced a retreat. The Austrians left on the field 10,000 dead, more than 2,000 wounded. Sixty guns were captured.

A numerically inferior army of Montenegrins defeated the Austrians near Bleik, in Bosnia, and the Montenegrins are pursuing the enemy.

DANISH STEAMER BLOWN UP

GRIMSBY, Eng., Sept. 2.—A Danish steamer is reported to have been blown up by a mine, but the nineteen members of her crew were saved by a trawler. The trawler Stett was sunk by a German warship, according to a telegram received from the skipper who is at Amsterdam. He reported all hands on board of the trawler had been saved.

MINE DESTROYS TRAWLER

GRIMSBY, Eng., Sept. 2.—(via London), 11:15 p.m.—A trawler was blown up by a mine in the North Sea today, and seven of her men are missing. The trawler was endeavoring to avoid one mine when it struck another.

German Sortie Unsuccessful.

LONDON, Sept. 3.—4:09 a.m.—A Petrograd (St. Petersburg) special to the Reuter Telegram Company says that the garrison at Königsberg, East Prussia, has made an unsuccessful attempt at a sortie.

Defense of Berlin Is Strengthened

Italian Socialists Indignant When Asked To Aid Germany.

ROME (via Paris), Sept. 2.—3:15 p.m.—The German Socialist Deputies, Hugo Haase and Albert Sieckmann, came to Italy in an effort to induce the Italian Socialist Party to use their influence to have Italy join Germany in the war.

The mission failed and the Italian Socialists have now published a protest against what they describe as an attempt against the dignity of Italy. They also express the hope that if a cessation of hostilities is impossible, the "infamous war will crush those who provoked it."

Canada May Cancel All German Patents

OTTAWA, Sept. 2.—The Canadian Government is considering the advisability of cancelling German patents and copyrights held in Canada. The question is being discussed with the British Board of Trade.

The patents held in Canada cover chiefly chemical preparations and electrical apparatus.

WISHES PROJECT SUCCESS

Ambassador Spring - Rice
Talks Neutrality With
President Wilson.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—The British ambassador, Sir Cecil Arthur Spring-Rice, and President Wilson today discussed the European war at the first formal call of the ambassador at the White House since his return from Europe. The ambassador also conveyed the personal condolences of Sir Edward Grey for the death of Mrs. Wilson.

The ambassador referred in a feeling way to the position of the British Government on the proposed purchase of German ships for the American merchant marine. The president was informed that Great Britain would place no obstacle in the way, and wished the project success. The British Government feels, however, that certain questions will require diplomatic discussion, but believes these can be satisfactorily adjusted.

Might Aid Germany Too Well.
While not disputing the right of the United States to purchase as many ships from one belligerent nation as she chooses, Great Britain would not be pleased if a great number of vessels were bought from German owners, a circumstance that might give Germany a big supply of money.

The answer of the American Government to this idea is that when the time for purchasing ships arrives, nothing of an unusual nature will be done, and as equitable an arrangement as possible will be sought.

GERMANS ABANDON MOVE ON BELFORT

BASEL, Switzerland, Sept. 2. (Via Rome).—The Germans have abandoned their move to take the French fortress of Belfort as the result of the Russian offensive movement in Eastern Prussia. The great army of 150,000 German and Austrian troops, which crossed the Rhine several days ago accompanied by a large number of heavy Krupp siege guns, have been withdrawn from Alsace and started for the north through Metz to replace the German troops withdrawn from the lines in the north of Lorraine and the Department of Moselle et Meuse.

ANTWERP EXPECTS TO BE BOMBARDED

Preparations Made On News
of German Movements
On the Dutch
Frontier.

London, Sept. 2.—A dispatch to the Daily News from Rotterdam says:

"Preparations are being made at Antwerp for an immediate bombardment."

"From Terneuzen, on the Dutch frontier near Antwerp, reports come of a general movement of German troops eastward. Exhausted men are being replaced in all directions by reserves. The movement is also believed to be connected with the arrival of the Landsturm reservists who are to occupy the whole Belgian territory."

"The move of trains for civilian purposes south of Ghent has again commenced."

MISSING FARMER A GERMAN OFFICER

Man Who Bought Fruit Land
in Blenheim Disappeared
When War Came.
