SIXTEEN FAMILIES
MADE HOMELESS

Twenty-Five Buildings in Powassan Destroyed by Fire—
Loss Reaches \$300,000.

NORTH BAY, June 7.—Twenty-five buildings were destroyed and sixteen families burned out in a fire which this morning swept the village of Powassan.

North Bay and Callender were called upon for assistance and sent sections of their brigades, who rendered valuable assistance.

The fire started in the cellar of the Queen's Hotel, which was totally destroyed. Other buildings burned were: Kelly and Anderson's general store, A. Graways store and residence, D. Cushman's residence, a barber shop and poolroom, office of Dr. Harcourt, R. Barber's confectionary store, G. Drinkwater's dwelling, F. B. Backler's residence and office, R. Barrett's residence and photograph studio, and A. Mitchell's residence.

In addition, the Trout Creek Lumber Company lost a million feet of lumber and considerable bark and pulpwood was destroyed. The total loss is estimated at \$300,000, with insurance of about half that amount.

EXPERTS BAFFLED
IN ATTEMPTING TO
CAP BIG GAS WELL

Strong Packer Ripped to Pieces
Like Paper When Inserted—
Three Men Overcome by
Gas While Working on It.

PETROLEA, June 7.—So far all efforts to cap the big gas well have been in vain, and experts declare that the flow of gas is becoming steadily stronger.

It was found that capping by the ordinary way of screwing a cap on top of the casing was impossible, and it was decided to try to cap the well by running down about 900 feet of 3-inch pipe and using a "packer." This packer is of the very best rubber on iron and about 400 feet above the gas rock is about an inch thick.

Yesterday afternoon a 3-inch pipe was put in, during which work three men were overcome by gas and carried out, and the packer was started down the hole. No sooner had it started to somewhat restrict the flow of gas than it was ripped as if it were tissue paper and made useless, thus halting operations.

Another Attempt Today.
It was intended to motor to London after a new one, and another attempt will be made to cap the big well on Monday. This delay is most expensive, as the company has to pay nearly a score of men ten dollars a day to risk their lives in the attempt to cap the well. There is certainly real danger. The men work with their ears wadded with batting and handkerchiefs over their ears. Some wear goggles to protect their eyes. Hats and ropes blew around as in a 90-mile-an-hour gale.

Although the gas does not smell it is just as deadly, and, as J. M. Cooper, driller for Union Gas Company, expressed it, "Just get a whiff of that gas in the right way and you're a dead man. People think it is a joke, but there's every kind of danger."

Mr. Glover, manager of the Union Gas Company, who has had every kind of experience in this line, made an effort to cap the well, but along with two others was overcome with gas.

Besides this there are nearly 40,000,000 feet of gas wasted each day. That is, there is already about \$16,000 worth of gas lost, estimated at only ten cents a thousand.

Through quiet parts of the country when the wind is favorable the roar of the gas can be heard ten miles away. When within fifty feet of the well shouting into a person's ear is useless, for one cannot be heard. All conversation between The Advertiser representative and the drillers had to be carried on in writing.

People are flocking today from all parts of Lambton to see this wonder, and there are never less than a score of people standing about with hands over their ears.

J. M. Cooper, driller for the Union Gas Company, has brought in 1,000,000 feet per day from a gas well about a quarter of a mile south of the big well, and is well satisfied. This is the attitude of most drillers of the district, for if many big wells were brought in there would only be a few put down and by this both district and drillers would be losers.

FORMAL SUSPENSION.

R. E. BUTLER CHOSEN
TO OPPOSE ROWELL

For the Fourth Time Candidate
in North Oxford—Hon. W.
J. Hanna Present.

WOODSTOCK, June 6.—R. E. Butler, on three previous occasions an unsuccessful aspirant under Conservative auspices for provincial parliamentary honors, was nominated at a convention of the North Oxford Conservative Association in the city hall here today as the party's champion for the fourth time to contest the constituency with N. W. Rowell.

Five names were placed before the convention, but two of them, John R. Shaw, Woodstock, and Robert Johnston, Woodstock, withdrew. Robert Lockhart, Woodstock, and Daniel Quinn, Thamesford, allowed their names to stand, but it was evident from the beginning that Butler would be the choice of the meeting.

W. J. Hanna, provincial secretary, was the speaker of the afternoon, and in order to give him an opportunity to say all he had to say, the other speakers were limited to five-minute addresses in the case of those who decided to stand for nomination, and to two-minute addresses in the case of those who wished to withdraw.

Plea From Mr. Lockhart.

Mr. Lockhart, who contested the riding in 1911, made a pathetic appeal to be given a second chance.

"What's the good," he asked, "of sending back these men who have tried and failed three or four times. If I had run and been beaten twice you would not see my face here today. I ran once and I was beaten, but it's only British fair play to give me a second chance."

Mr. Butler said he regretted that the temperance question had been raised in the campaign. He described it as the football, which was being kicked about to obscure the real issue, but he didn't attempt to explain what the real issue was. He declared he was a better temperance man than N. W. Rowell.

If Mr. Hanna is to be believed, there never was such a splendid body of men as the members of the cabinet of Sir James Whitney's government, whereas, according to him, the Liberal party never contributed anything at all in the way of reform. Since his audience consisted of Conservatives, of course, his utterances went unchallenged.

Makes Fun of the Rowell Banishment.

He made fun of the Rowell banishment policy, declaring that it was made a plank in the Liberal leader's platform only because the latter could think of no other planks out of which to build a platform. He even went further, and charged that Mr. Rowell's policy was the stolen from the Conservative party; that, in fact, Mr. Rowell had only adopted that policy, because he realized that otherwise the credit for reform in the matter of the liquor traffic would be given to the Government.

ORDAINED AT SARNIA

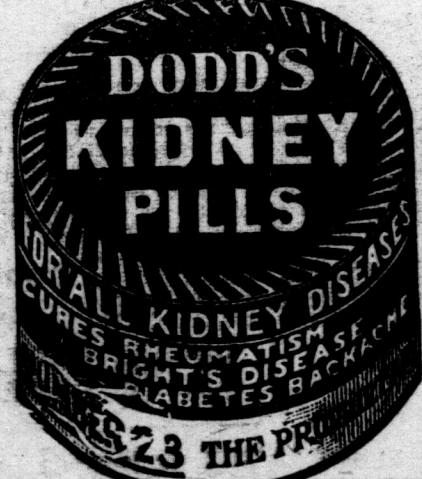
Will Enter the Ministry of

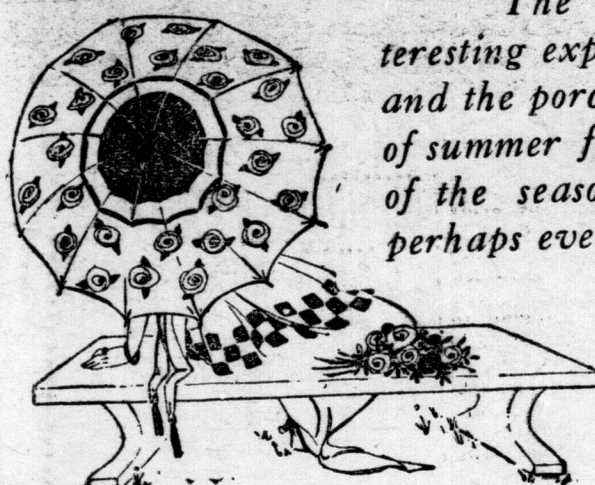
