CONDEMN FOUR CARGOES
British Prize Court Takes Fodder From American and Scandinavian Boats.

LONDON, June 9.—The prize court has condemned as lawful prizes the cargoes of the American steamer Joseph W. Fordney and three Scandinavian vessels from American ports. The cargoes, consisting almost entirely of fodder, comprise the most valuable seizure since those of the meat cargoes shipped by American packers.

Arthur G. Hays, the attorney for the claimants, will appeal from the decision.

MRS. FISKE TO PLAY AT AUDITORIUM MONDAY
Famous Actress Will Picture "Vanity Fair," Her Famous Impersonation.

Mrs. Fiske, who was engaged especially by the Edison Company to perpetuate in film her famous impersonation of Becky Sharp, will be seen Monday at the Auditorium. She has some interesting things to say of her experience before the motion picture camera.

The picturing of "Vanity Fair" is especially interesting to me," says Mrs. Fiske, "because of the artistic problems that it presents. Every problem solved in any art means just so much advancement, of course. In the picturing of Thackeray's novel the problems are not of a physical nature—such as the direction of the makers of pictures seem to have gone as far as is humanly possible—but they are the far more elusive problems of presenting wit and satire without the spoken word."

"I think that we have accomplished a great deal in this direction in the 'Vanity Fair' picture, and that through the efforts of the producers and director, the atmosphere of the time and place has been quite wonderfully preserved."

"Frankly, I believe that the motion picture, as a medium of artistic expression, is still in its formative state. It is an art that has not yet found itself—though it has assuredly found its public. Really it has not so far found a suitable name for itself—as witness the various absurd and vague terms that are used to identify it. When its further capacities have been discovered; when its limitations have been fixed, then shall we have in the motion picture an art form that will be, in the full meaning of the term, superb. Its possibilities reach beyond the boundaries of the imagination. That is why it is so fascinating to the artist. It is a new road, pressing further and further through a wilderness of great possibilities and at every step one is likely to meet with some new and delightful artistic adventure."

CITY NOT NEGLIGENT IN SEWAGE PROVISION, DECLARES ENGINEER
Willis Chipman Points Out Mistake in Report.

TAKES CARE OF WATER
Storm Sewers Are Doing All That Was Expected of Them.

At a meeting of the board of control yesterday afternoon, Willis Chipman, designer of the storm sewer system, paid his respects to the report of the provincial board of health, in which the storm and sanitary sewer systems were condemned.

He pointed out several discrepancies in the report, and declared that the city is doing all that can be reasonably expected in taking care of the sewage. The storm sewer system was not designed, he said, to relieve the sanitary system of sewage. All it was intended to do was to take care of the storm water, which it would do. Sewage would not be dumped directly into the river as the report stated. Mr. Chipman declared that the statement that 50 per cent of the raw sewage was dumped in the river direct was absolutely untrue. The storm sewer system would not relieve the 20-inch siphon pipe.

Not Negligent.
"I think the city has done and is doing all that can be reasonably expected to take care of the sewage," said Mr. Chipman. "You certainly have not been negligent."

Mr. Chipman reported on the progress of the construction work of the storm sewer system, declaring that it was satisfactory.

The Ministerial Association asked for 80 feet of the Federal Square property for a gospel tent. As it was required on the corner, this would necessitate the removal of the recruiting sign. The board took no definite action, but will see whether or not provision can be made on other portions of the lot.

Going to Rochester.
City Engineer Braider will be sent to Rochester to look into the Packard blower truck. Geo. Heaman & Sons reported that it would be impossible to furnish the truck contracted for until the fall, so the board will look into the Packard truck, the next highest bidder.

City Solicitor Meredith informed the board that further legislation looking to the better control of street railways would not come up until the next meeting of the Legislature. He would inform the board when the proper time had arrived to suggest amendments.

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Bylaws relative to silent zones about hospitals and the dimming of motor headlights on paved streets will be submitted at the next meeting.

SCARCITY OF BOYS TO GO OUT ON FARMS
Expected Shortage Will End When School Holidays Commence.

There was a large attendance at a very successful meeting of the Foster Home committee of the Children's Aid Society in the courthouse yesterday. A number of applications for children were received, and some interesting problems discussed.

It was found that there was not a great number of boys who were willing to leave school now to go to farms for the purpose of helping solve the labor problem. This is expected to be remedied when school closes in a few weeks. Two boys aged 15 and 17, however, agreed to go.

A report was received from the inspector of Huron County. He stated that a child placed in a home there by the London society, although well cared for, was in a sickly condition. He recommended sanatorium treatment.

The case of some soldiers' children in the shelter was discussed. The mother of one family is dead, and that of the other in the hospital. There are seven children in this family, and a grant is received from the Patriotic Society. The city is paying for the maintenance of the mother in the hospital.

The committee was of the opinion that some action should be taken to relieve the society from maintaining the children.

TWO POLICEWOMEN REQUIRED IN LONDON, PETITIONERS DECLARE
Big Delegation Asks Commissioners to Consider Matter.

SUCCESSFUL ELSEWHERE
Mrs. Boomer Says Social Workers Are Hindered by Lack of Authority.

A monster petition, signed and endorsed by more than thirty local women's clubs and organizations, was presented to the police commission yesterday afternoon by a deputation of thirty women from the leading women's organizations of the city, headed by Mrs. H. A. Boomer, asking that two policewomen be authorized for London. Addresses, pointing out London's need of a policewoman, were made by Mrs. Frank White, Mrs. Thornley, Mrs. (Dr.) Hughes and Miss Moore of the Y.W.C.A.

Mrs. Boomer pointed out that social workers of the city and special officers of the various social bodies, had been hindered in their work by the lack of authority to make arrests if necessary, but chiefly in the lack of an authoritative badge or insignia to make people respect them. She stated that the deputation would prefer to select the material from which the commission was to choose the officers.

Miss Moore cited the work of the representative of the Travelers' Aid Society, who is at the Grand Trunk station to assist women who are coming into the city, as an example of the good work which might be done. She said that the lady at the station frequently could do better work had she been empowered with the authority of a police officer.

Mrs. Frank White and Mrs. (Dr.) Hughes gave examples of the success which had attended the introduction of a policewoman in other Canadian and American cities. Mrs. White read a letter from the chief of police in Toronto, commending the work done by women police in that city.

The deputation declared that more than fifty per cent of the citizens of London are women and that they should have women to do police work of certain kinds among them. As men can best deal with men, so women can best deal with women, they said.

Magistrate J. C. Judd declared himself to be decidedly against the idea of two policewomen and refused to give his opinion of the need of one. The commission will discuss the question with Judge Macbeth, who was absent from the meeting.

CATHOLIC PICNIC TO BE HELD ON WEDNESDAY
Outing Planned for Last Half-Holiday Was Spoiled by Rain.

The Catholic union choir picnic of London and St. Thomas, which was somewhat marred by the heavy downpour of rain on Wednesday afternoon last, will be held next Wednesday afternoon, June 14, according to the original arrangements. Some of London's best musical and other talent will appear on the program. Preceding the program a lunch will be served in the balcony of the dancing hall in the "Casino" at 6 o'clock. The program will commence at 6:30 sharp, dancing at 8:15. A first-class orchestra will furnish the music. All London and St. Thomas citizens and others from the outside are most cordially invited.

VERDICT FOR PLAINTIFF
Suit Over Store Fittings Heard in the County Court.

Two more cases were tried yesterday afternoon at the general sessions and the sitting of the county court, before Judge Macbeth.

In the case of the London and Western Trusts vs. I. T. Fox, judgment was given against the defendant for \$113.76 without costs. The plaintiffs sold the fittings of a bankrupt store to Fox at a rate of 33 2/3 per cent on the dollar. Fox claimed the goods were unsatisfactory and too high-priced, and stopped payments on them.

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The company was forced to sell the fittings elsewhere at a rate of only 30 per cent on the dollar.

According to the judgment Fox will have to pay the difference caused by selling at a lower rate.

Decision was reserved in the case of J. Levy vs. Greene Swift Company. He brought a claim against them, his

former employers, for \$500. He claims he was wrongfully discharged in 1911 and was not able to get work again.

TWO BROTHERS DIE, FORMER LONDONERS
Albert and George Wagner Pass Away at Niagara Falls Within a Week.

Albert Wagner, a former well-known London ball player, a member of the West London Grays, died at his home at Niagara Falls on May 30, and on June 4 his brother George died.

When in this city they were residents of the North End.
