SETTLEMENT BOARD ISSUES A WARNING

From the director of information of the soldier settlement board at Ottawa comes a general warning for all returned men who take up land in Canada not to violate any of the regulations set down in the contract.

The director cites a recent instance to lay stress on his subject. He points out that before the district judge at Sherbrooke, Quebec, a soldier settler, Edouard Balthazar, pleading guilty to a charge of defrauding the soldier settlement board of farming equipment to the value of \$1,800, was sentenced to six months' hard labor. The prisoner also, he advises, disposed of stock, including 14 cows and 2 horses.

In passing sentence, the bench denounced in strong terms by parties to blame, and the board accordingly desires this to act as a deterrent to others.

URGES CHURCH TO APPEAL TO YOUTH

Rev. A. J. Henderson, of Illi-
nois Conference, Speaks
at Centennial.

Rev. A. J. Henderson, formerly of the Methodist conference in the Province of Saskatchewan, but now of the Illinois Conference, addressed the combined congregations of the King Street Presbyterian Church and the Centennial Methodist Church on Sunday evening in the Centennial. His subject was "The Modern Sense of Sin," and his sermon was based on the story of the rich young man, and the text, "All these things have I kept from my youth up. What lack I yet?"

In his sermon Rev. Mr. Henderson dealt with the problem of combating the apparent shallowness of the rising generation in their sense of sin and of reaching and bringing into the church the average sinner, or in other words the average man who usually was neither very good or very bad. He also made a plea that God should be the chief passion of every man's life instead of the accumulation of wealth, which is often the case.

Entirely Different.
"People today," he said, "do not think of sin as their forefathers had done. The rising generation are taking it in an entirely different way. There is a lapse of seriousness in the minds of the present-day youth."

He attributed this to the lack of emotion in the modern form of worship and the absence of the religious of the great founders of the modern churches.

WESTERN WHEAT OUTLOOK GOOD

Heaviest Crop Since 1915 in
Saskatoon District of
Excellent Quality.

The following is a brief synopsis of the telegraphic reports received from the branch managers of the Bank of Montreal from various parts of the Dominion:

Prairie Provinces.
Edmonton District—Cutting of wheat is general and outlook on the whole very favorable. Yield should be high.

Quebec and Ontario.
Harvesting operations are well under way and a yield of 60 to 70 per cent of an average crop is expected. Recent rains have been beneficial to root crops and grass pasture.

Maritime Provinces.
Cereals will be light, having been adversely affected by the prolonged drought. Oats expected to be about 60 per cent of average. Recent rains have improved late crops of roots and grass pasture. Potatoes give promise of a light crop, probably 60 per cent to 75 per cent of average. The Nova Scotia apple crop is expected to be fairly good. Prince Edward Island reports potato and other crops much improved from recent rains.

British Columbia.
Continued dry weather affecting all crops, particularly roots, although better crops have been taken throughout Fraser Valley, which should assure previous estimate of potato yield of 80 per cent. Onions and tomatoes good yield on smaller acreage. Grains are in good condition. Cutting general, average yield. Hops report very good. Okanogan apple crop is holding to previous very satisfactory estimates. Kootenay and other districts report tree fruits below average. Pastureage is fair.

Desperately shielding her son's baby from a furious injury, Mrs. J. Riley of Munsey is now suffering from severe bruises about the head, shoulders and arms, received when the automobile in which she was riding was struck and completely overturned Sunday afternoon by a car driven by John Ruddy, 780 Richmond street.

The collision occurred at the intersection of Queen's avenue and Maitland street. The Rileys were proceeding south on the latter thoroughfare, they state, when the Ruddy car, coming west on Queen's avenue, crashed into them. The impact was of sufficient force to upset their machine, and in her supreme effort to save the baby passenger, it is said, the elderly woman sustained her injuries. That the entire party escaped as they did without fatalities is recorded as marvelous.

STRESSES NEED OF TEACHING EUROPEANS

Should Be Instructed in Cana-
dian Ideals, States West-
ern Minister.

An interesting illustrated address on the problem of the non-English speaking peoples who are coming into Canada and settling especially in the West was given in Empress Avenue Methodist Church by Rev. James Wilkins of Manitoba, last night. The service was held under the auspices of the Epworth League of the church, and a special feature apart from the unusual event of the use of lantern pictures to illustrate the address was the excellent musical program provided by the Sunday school orchestra. A delightfully-rendered solo was sung by Miss J. Mosley.

The pictures were intensely interesting, and Mr. Wilkins stressed strongly the great need that Canada should give special heed to the training of these people, especially the children, in Canadian ideals. In Manitoba, he said that over 50 per cent of the population is now comprised of non-English speaking peoples from Central European countries, the majority being of Slavic nationality. This means, he added, that in the hands of less than 50 per cent of the population lies the responsibility of maintaining Canadian ideals and the instilling of these ideals amongst the new arrivals.

POLICE COURT GUESTS DECIDED THEIR OWN CASES THIS MORNING

lett Out of City.

MAJORITY PAID FINES

Some Cases Laid Over Pending
Return of the Magis-
trate.

With Police Magistrate A. M. Graydon unexpectedly ill, and Deputy Magistrate Bartlett out of the city, there was no regular official police session today. Inspector "Bud" Lucas, Police Court Clerk John Moule, Acting Crown Attorney McMaisters, Chief of Detectives Thomas Nickie and others "carried on" wherever possible, and all who were charged with minor offences, drunkenness, etc., were, if they dared, allowed to plead guilty, pay the usual fine and depart. Squire Chittick also graced the court in his presence throughout the session in strictly an advisory capacity, as did J. M. McVoy, K.C.

David Martin, when first arrested, was charged with both intoxication and having in other than a private dwelling place a quantity of liquor. David's problem was one of the first to be shelved indefinitely until the magistrate's return. Resigned to his fate David resumed his seat in the dock, but several minutes later Inspector Lucas, after close consultation with various wings of the law, announced the glad tidings that there was no evidence at hand. David accordingly was given free.

Paid Their Fines.
The typical week-end collection of belligerent drunks, and all who declared their willingness to overlook the fact that there was no magistrate this morning, waived all pretense of a defence and paid their fines. Among these were members of the party that was broken up by the police late Saturday evening just as a "friendly" game was progressing.

SIX DIE FROM TYPHOID FEVER; LATEST SUNDAY

Epidemic at Ontario Hospital
Abating—70 Patients in
Convalescent Stage.

Six deaths have been reported at the Ontario Hospital as a result of the typhoid fever epidemic. The latest was recorded on Sunday. At the present time there are 79 patients suffering from the fever.

Dr. W. J. Robinson, the superintendent, stated to The Advertiser that although the epidemic has been serious, the majority of the patients are now on the verge of convalescence, and that no danger of a further outbreak is feared.

Springbank concession men, six in number, are appearing before Squire Chittick this afternoon at 2:30 in connection with charges or running games of chance.

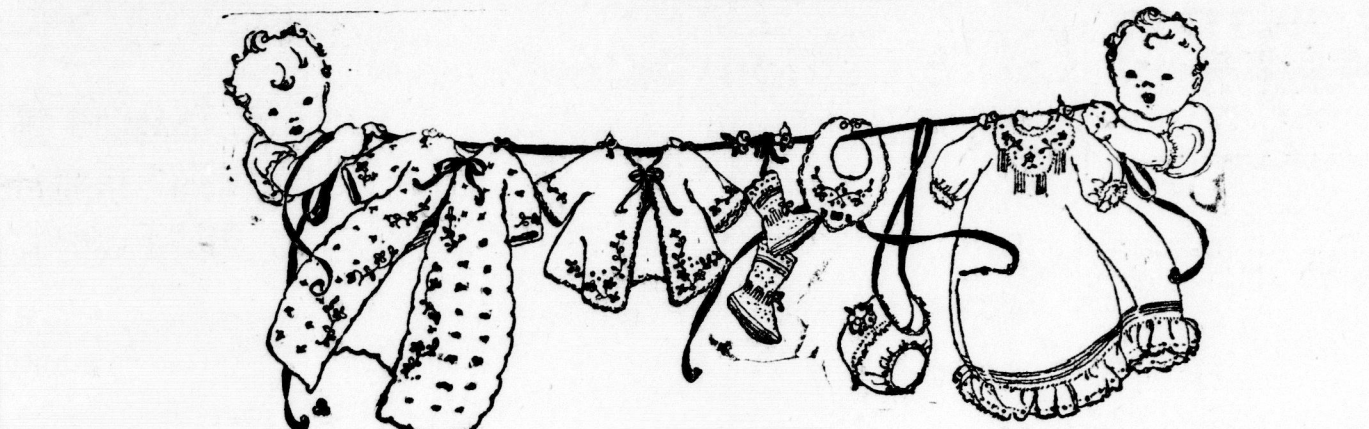
