London Board of Health Is Unable To Act Unless Some Case Is Cited.

Council Notified of Decision.

Unless a specific instance is re orded the London board of health inds itself unable to conduct any nspection of city dental parlors as equested by the local Trades and Laber Council. Secretary Burk of the latter body, the union officials say, is in receipt of a communicatio

About a month ago Delegate William Tite moved during a session of the trades council that the provincial health authorities be petitioned to enact such legislation as would be necessary to bring about a general of dental parlors and workrooms in London to insure that all would be kept constantly in a state of complete sanitation.

At the last regular session of the ouncil a communication was read from the provincial officer of health in Toronto advising receipt of the resolution and explaining that the London Board of Health had been also notified accordingly.

The labor representatives explain hat they did not desire to name any dentist in particular, although two or three names had been brought to their attention. They simply desired inspection be conducted of all and if legislation be necessary for such that the same be enacted.
