## CITY FINANCES

### RELIEF WORKS

Council Authorizes Advance of \$15,000 to Association Aiding Unemployed.

### GOVERNMENTS TO REPAY

Total of \$21,000 Will Be Refunded in Federal and Provincial Grants.

BRANTFORD, March 10.—Harvey S. Watt and F. W. Thompson, of the Brantford Relief Association, presented the case of the association to the city council this evening, appealing for civic financing until the provincial and federal grants for relief are paid. This was given.

Mr. Watt, treasurer, read a letter to the city treasurer, showing the standing of the fund at the end of February. By that time, \$32,000 had been spent and \$8,000 was outstanding. There were \$5,000 in pledges not collected, and it was expected that 75 per cent of this would be collected. The association needed \$4,000 to be financed by the council with the federal and provincial grants, payments of which would be delayed until April.

The association expected to come out even. The total resources reached \$26,000, with the government grants and the money raised by voluntary subscriptions. The city would not be asked to pay one cent out of taxes, though temporary financing was necessary at the present moment. He paid a tribute to the work of Messrs. Thompson, Glover and Hutcheon, the board in charge.

Asked by Acting Mayor Parker, Mr. Watt reported that the money expected from the two governments totaled \$23,000.

Ald. Bragg asked if the demand for relief was dropped.

Demand Less Acute.

He was assured it was. F. W. Thompson presented a full report, covering 16 weeks. He showed that 847 families had been aided with 7,643 orders, totalling \$34,165.31. In all 242 tons of coal were delivered. The average daily expenditure was \$363.46.

The last two weeks in February were the weeks in which the demand was the greatest.

Ald. Reeves pointed out that orders for coal and wood were credited to the city's fuel department of some years ago.

Ald. Ballantyne thought the officials should be heartily commended for the splendid way in which they had administered the funds.

Ald. Bragg thought the report an excellent one. There was nothing that could be done except to carry on. It was gratifying to note that the demand was lessening and with the coming of spring more work would open up, and there would be fewer demands.

The city treasurer was authorized to finance the association to the extent of a further \$15,000, as well as the \$6,000 already authorized, to be repaid by the government grants.

Thanks Council.

Mr. Watt extended thanks for the action of the council, and invited the members to come up to the headquarters to see how the work was carried on. He stressed the fact that the work was being carried on without any direct draft on the city treasurer.

So far this year, Brantford township has expended just over six thousand dollars in relief work for its unemployed and needy, according to figures obtained today at the office of the township clerk. This sum has been distributed as follows, the figures being approximate. For repair operations on the river road dike, Parkdale, \$4,000; for the Echo Dyke drain, \$1,000; and for immediate relief purposes authorized by the Brantford township relief association, \$1,100. This makes a total of \$6,100.

All of the immediate relief employment work was completed this morning with the finishing of operations on the Echo Dyke drain. The work has been under the supervision of Roger M. Lee, township engineer.

May Find More Work.

Reeve R. H. Henry said today that the township council would endeavor to see if there is not something more in the way of necessary relief work yet to be undertaken before the spring comes. The need for relief, while not as acute as during the past two months, is still felt. All of the money directly spent in the amelioration of want among

needy residents has been disbursed through the care of the relief association which was formed at the beginning of the year for just such a purpose. Its chairman is Rev. J. N. H. Mills, rector of St. James Church.

Dave Harding, who was in a fair way to becoming one of the best defence players in intermediate lacrosse, is attending Queen's University. He is said to be contemplating taking a summer course at the Presbyterian Institute, and will therefore be unavailable for the local squad. Dave Howard, who made certain of a place for himself on the local line-up in the last game with St. Marys, will leave for the University of Toronto after the holidays, and will not be available when the semi-finals come around. Cottam, one of the new players of last year, will not be here for the 1922 team.

town hall today, and the same time vowed to close every business by force. Commandos are out in large bodies and mounted police are stationed at vantage points.

Mob law rules on the east and west Rand, and only ordinary activities are possible in Johannesburg. Several more natives have died as a result of the recent attack by commandos. Twenty-seven are seriously wounded, chiefly from charges from shotguns. Two more were shot in cold blood outside the town compound, and five others died as the result from shootings at the new Primrose mine. The strikers seemed to be at their wits end to find excuses for killing innocent natives. The authorities say the strikers endeavored to spread a report that the natives were rising on the Witwatersrand, but it is officially stated that the report is false.

The Star, in a leading article, says: "Commandos are permitted to roam the streets with blazing revolvers and carrying all kinds of weapons. The police permit them to enter workshops and cafes, intimidating the workers, also the government railway shops, with a large force of police looking on."

The Premier's Appeal.  
A mail train was derailed near Germiston, but no person was injured thereby. Four cases of dynamiting are reported.

THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF SOUTH AFRICA is closely engaged in the Rand struggle. Laborite members and ministerialists each accuse the other of responsibility for the outrages which have been occurring. Premier Smuts declared today that the people were face to face with one of the gravest situations that had yet arisen in South Africa. The behavior of the Rand natives had been irreproachable, he said, but the whites had nothing to be proud of. Despite the fact that the native territories had been practically denuded of police, who had been sent to the Rand, the lives of the sprinkling of whites there today were safe in the hands of the millions of natives.

Premier Smuts denounced the outrages, whether committed by whites or blacks, and declared that they would lead to serious consequences in the most distant parts of South Africa. He stated that in view of the emergence of hooligan elements the government had given instructions that very strong measures must be used to suppress lawlessness. The premier concluded by appealing to the influential citizens to keep the natives out of the last critical, dangerous phase of the struggle.

## HUNT TREASURE IN TOBERMORAY BAY

London, March 11.—The new syndicate which has been formed to recover the treasure from the Armada Galleon in Tobermory Harbor, has begun work.
