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SYNOD ADOPTS NEW BASIS FOR DIVISION OF BUDGET

Proposals For Experiments in Limited Appointments Is Rejected.

MOTION WITHDRAWN

Claim System Opposed To Anglican Custom of Permanent Clergy.

The adoption of a canon providing a new basis of budget apportionment and the rejection of a proposal to make mission charges the seat of an experiment in limited appointments were two outstanding features of the closing session of the Synod of Huron yesterday afternoon.

The bishop, in his annual charge delivered Tuesday morning, indicated a certain desire on the part of parochial committees for limited appointments. He advanced in this connection, arguments, both for and against such a system, which is directly opposed to the time-honored Anglican custom of permanent clergy. A resolution to make the mission charges the seat of an experiment in this direction was brought in by the Very Rev. L. Norman Tucker, the dean of Huron and chairman of the committee on the bishop's charge. It was seconded by Venerable Archdeacon Fotheringham of Brantford, and both clergy withdrew their motion in the face of opposition from the synod, stating that they themselves were not wedded to the idea of limited appointments, nor did they believe in having the experiment tried out first in the mission stations. The custom is, however, to take some action on a suggestion of the bishop's charge.

Commencing June, 1924, budget apportionments for the synod will be made out according to the canon sponsored at the morning session by Venerable Archdeacon Doherty.

Lengthy Debate.

After a debate lasting the entire morning and for a considerable length into the afternoon, the canon with amendments was adopted as a whole and the budget apportionment will be carried out with the sum of the necessary expenditures of each congregation in the diocese, and of its share in the net revenue from the parochial endowment, if any, as a basis.

The canon provides for an annual report to the synod office of a detailed account of all necessary expenditures during the year, this information to be supplied on a printed form sent out from the synod office, and to form the basis of the budget apportionment. The system to be followed in this report is that used by the general synod in collecting its budget apportionment from the various diocesan synods in the Dominion.

Considered an important clause in Archdeacon Doherty's motion was the following: "Every congregation in the diocese shall have the right of appeal to the executive committee for a reduction of its budget apportionment, but such an appeal must be in writing, signed by the incumbent and churchwardens, and be sent to the secretary-treasurer of the synod before the first day of December, said appeal to be considered and finally determined at the December meeting of the executive committee, which shall have the power to revise the basis of apportionment of any congregation in the diocese."

Amendment Adopted.

In addition, the following amendment, introduced by Rev. H. W. Snell, was adopted: "Provided that 75 per cent of the apportionment may be apportioned by the executive committee directly to the parishes, the remaining 25 per cent to the J. S. Adams fund, to be distributed by them equitably to the various parishes."

The report brought in by the committee on the charge with regard to the misuse of missionary giving is present to see that it was brought to the attention of all churchwardens that all contributions are trust funds and must be treated as such. On the Women's Auxiliaries, they reported that the work of the organization should be allowed free scope, and that the co-operation of the W. A. should be secured in making up the budget apportionments, and further that an effort should be made to establish a branch of the W. A. in every congregation of the diocese.

With regard to widows' pensions, the committee recommended that in recognition of the present inadequacy of the pension scheme, the bishop be requested to name a committee of five to give effect to the plan suggested by Senator McCall in the bishop's charge.

On Huron College, a recommendation was brought in that a committee of the synod be appointed to work in collaboration with the college authorities and the alumnae to give full effect to the efforts to raise the necessary additional endowment.

Emigration To U. S.

At this point the question of emigration to the United States, which pops up at almost every public meeting in the country, made its way into the Synod of Huron. Sheriff Johnston of Sarma stated that laymen were to a large extent unwilling to make contributions to the jubilee fund of the congregation, without some assurance that the students benefited would remain in the diocese and at least within Canada itself, and not join the exodus to the United States. Discussion ensuing revealed that the fact that Huron College was not alone in producing graduates who entered the ministry in the United States, but that similar procedure was going on in practically all other colleges. Many clergy-men, too, held that no restrictions should be placed on the choice of a field of work, whether in Canada, in missions or in the U. S. Among these was the Dean, who pointed out that the college in the first place had been a gift to the diocese, "freely have we received," he said, "freely let us give."

Boys' and Girls' Work.

With regard to boys' and girls' work, the charge laid emphasis on three points: the aims of the work should be religious, it should be under the control of the local church rather than outside organizations, and it should be also a training for the distinctive interests of the Anglican communion. The report recommended the appointing of a special committee to work with the Sunday School committee on this matter, and to report to the next synod.

The synod adopted the recommendation contained in the report of the Laymen's Association by Sheriff Johnston to the effect that each parish be asked to set aside a date when the chairman of the deacons or a layman appointed by him should have an opportunity of addressing the congregation on the matter of the budget apportionment.

In connection with the report on social service, presented by Dean Tucker, it was mentioned that the judge of the juvenile court in London, Rev. G. Q. Warner, was a clergyman of the Church of England, and a resolution of appreciation for Judge Warner's work, together with that of Mr. Justice Hardy, judge of the children's court in Brantford, and a lay delegate to the Synod, was unanimously passed.

A resolution submitted by Rev. R. J. Seton-Adams to change the limit of superannuation was referred to the Synod executive.

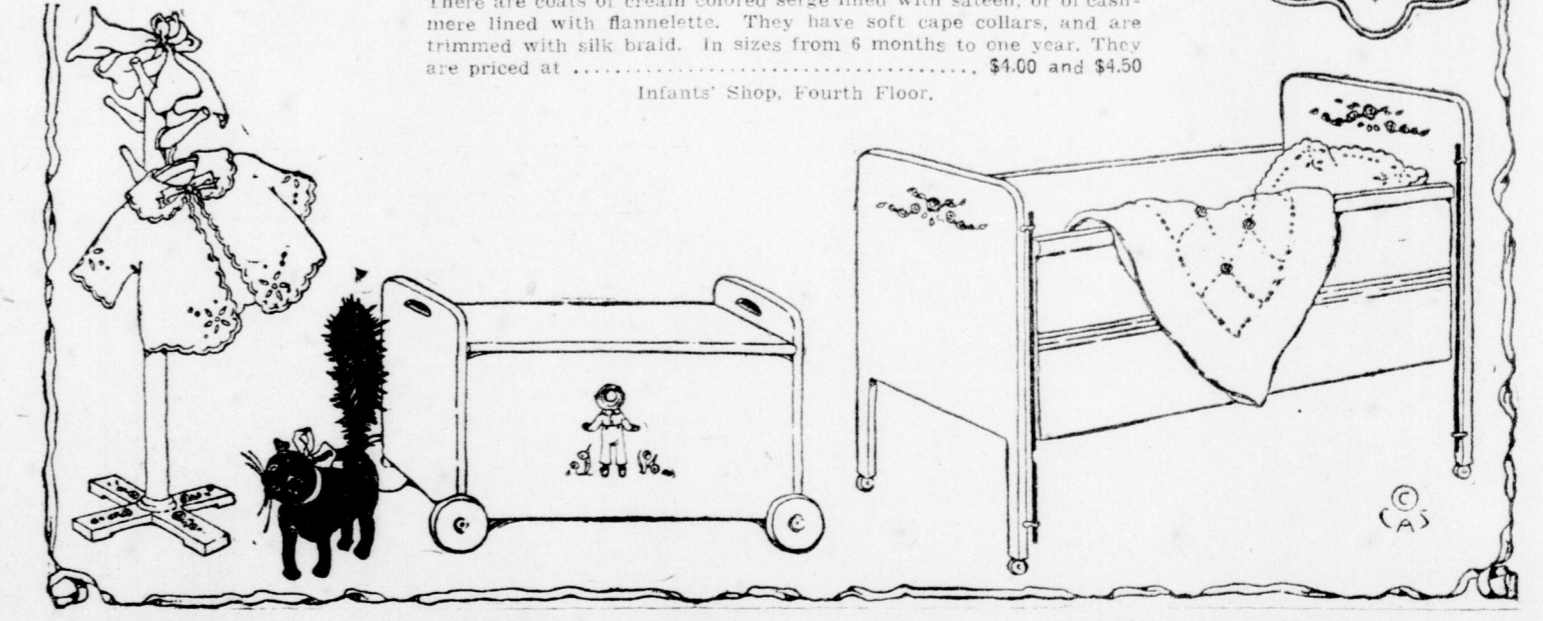
